The City Council met in regular session on Wednesday evening of last week, and the principal item of business was to award the contract for the extension of Main street to deep water of the Coquille river. The city engineer was ordered to go ahead and make the survey for the municipal water system, which is to be installed. Other matters of minor importance were discussed at the meeting.

Ordinance No. 160.

This is an Ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance providing for the improvement of Columbia Avenue between Fifth and Sixth Streets and providing for the assessment, collection and payment of the cost thereof."

THE CITY OF BANDON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 1. That Columbia Avenue for the full seventy feet width thereof and between the middle line of its intersection with Fifth Street southward to the middle line of its intersection with Sixth Street, shall be improved, including in said portion of said street a certain strip of land 30 feet wide deeded by H. D. Gerkin and wife to the City for street purposes, which improvement shall be in accordance with the amount of grading, cuts and fills hereinafter specified.

Sec. 2. Whereas, advertisement has been given by the Common Council of its intention to improve the East one-half of said portion of said Avenue by assessing the cost thereof to the property of the East side of said street which is adjacent thereto, being lots No. fifteen (15) and sixteen (16) of Block 21 in the Woolen Mill Addition to Bandon, and

Whereas, Ten days' notice thereof was given in the Bandon Recorder causing same to be published three successive times in said paper, it is hereby deemed by the Council that sufficient notice and advertisement has been given and made for the said proposed improvement and assessment, and

It further appearing that no remonstrance against such improvement has been made by the owners of two-thirds of the property in said Block 21, Woolen Mill Addition, fronting upon Columbia Avenue, or any remonstrance at all; it is therefore declared and ordered that such improvement shall be made; that in the West one-half of the above described portion of Columbia Avenue fronting upon Block 20, of said Addition, here shall be a cut made of 233.10 cubic yards, and there shall be a fill made of 109.07 cubic yards; and that in the East one-half of said portion of said street and in front of lot fifteen (15) Block 21, of said Addition there shall be made a cut of 840.93 cubic yards and a fill of 1.16 cubic yards, and that in front of lot sixteen (16) of said Block 21, there shall be made a cut of 105.84 cubic yards and a fill of 11.04 cubic yards; that the surface of said street when so graded shall be made uniform, the center line or crown of said street to be not less than 8, nor more than 14 inches above the side of the street at the gutters; that the middle or center line shall be uniform and shall be the grade of said portion of said street and is hereby declared to be such grade.

Sec. 3. That the cost of said street shall be assessed as follows: That the West one-half of said portion of said street shall be assessed to and paid for by the City of Bandon, by money appropriated from the general fund for such purpose, and

That whereas the probable cost of such improvement for the West one-half of said street will be upon liberal estimation the sum of Seventy-five (75) Dollars, therefore it is hereby declared that the said sum of Seventy-Five Dollars

shall be and is hereby appropriated from the said fund of the City of Bandon or so much thereof as shall be necessary for said purpose. Said sum to be paid upon or after the completion of the work as specified hereafter; that for the East one-half of said street, each lot shall pay for the improvement of the street directly in front of said street from the property line westward to the middle line of said Avenue, including both cut and fill, and each lot shall also be respectively liable for the adjoining one-fourth intersection of the cross-street.

Sec. 4. That immediately after this Ordinance shall become of full force and effect, then the City Recorder is hereby directed to post notices in at least three different public and conspicuous places within the City of Bandon, Oregon, advertising for a period of not less than 10 days that the Council will receive bids upon the above designated improvement, which bids may be any or any of them be rejected at the discretion of the Council.

Sec. 5. That if the Council shall see fit to accept the bid of the lowest responsible bidder, then same may be accepted by Resolution passed by acclamation vote, and thereupon the Street Committee, together with the City Engineer, if desired by them shall proceed to determine and assess upon each lot the actual, exact and proportionate cost for the improvement of said Street and shall also determine at said time the actual and exact cost for the improvement of the West one-half of said Avenue to be paid for by the City, and when the assessment upon the lots shall be determined, then the report may thereafter be declared by an Ordinance, and when so ordained shall immediately be entered in the Docket of City Liens as a lien against such property and collected by the Recorder in accordance with the law providing for the collection of delinquent taxes.

Sec. 6. Provided, that upon such assessment having been duly declared and entered into the Docket, pursuant to the acceptance of any bid, then the Mayor and the Recorder of the City after a Resolution therefor by the Council may enter into a contract for and on behalf of the City of Bandon with such bidder for the performance of such work of improvement as above specified, which contract shall be subject to such other conditions, including indemnity bond, as may be deemed most expedient by such Council or by it imposed.

Ordinance No. 161.

This instrument is an Ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance establishing a grade on Second Street in the Woolen Mill Addition from the West to the East end thereof."

THE CITY OF BANDON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 1. That Whereas the Council of the City of Bandon did upon the 15th day of April, 1910, pass a Resolution wherein it was determined to establish a grade on Second Street in the Woolen Mill Addition of the City of Bandon

between Pacific and Coquille Avenues, and whereas pursuant to such Resolution a notice of such resolution was published in the Bandon Recorder three times, the first on the 12th day of May, 1910, and the last on the 20th day of May, 1910, which said publication was supported by the affidavit of C. E. Kopf, made the 28th day of July, 1910, sworn and subscribed to before C. R. Wade, a Notary Public, and which affidavit was duly filed and recorded with the Recorder of the City of Bandon, and further appearing that no written remonstrance has been presented against the grade referred to by the owners of two-thirds of the adjacent property, or by any number thereof whatsoever or at all, and that the time for presenting such remonstrance has expired and it further appearing that six months has not expired since the last publication of said notice, now it therefore appears and is declared that proper and sufficient notice has been given of the Council's intention to establish such a grade, and that the Council of the City of Bandon has acquired jurisdiction over the establishment of such a grade and retains the same to this date. Now it is hereby declared and ordered that a grade shall be established upon said street in accordance with the specifications of the next section.

Sec. 2. That the grade referred to in the last section is hereby described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of Second Street in the Woolen Mill Addition to the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, with the East line of Pacific Avenue, otherwise known as Little Street, and from said line of intersection the grade following the center line of the street shall be as follows: Point of beginning being the intersection of the middle line of said Second Street with the East line of Pacific Avenue, which point shall have the elevation of 112.60 feet from said point continuing eastward to an elevation of 102.07 feet, being the West line of Columbia Avenue, such grade shall be uniform; and from the West line of Columbia Avenue eastward along the middle line of said Second Street to a point which is 240 feet East of the East boundary line of Columbia Avenue, the grade shall be on a level at the said elevation of 102.07 feet; from such point further Eastward the grade for a distance of 180 feet shall be a ten per cent. grade and from the last designated point to the West line of Coquille Avenue, being a distance of 30 feet more or less, the grade shall be six per cent.

Sec. 3. The grade so established shall be the center line of said Street for the full length thereof and shall be one foot higher than the side of the street at the gutter; that is the said street shall be crowned so that the above described line through the middle thereof shall be the official grade and represent the crown or highest part of the said street; and the gutter herein referred to shall be placed at a distance of 6 feet from and parallel with the outside edges of the street and that the sidewalk grade on each side of the said portion of said street shall be on a level with and correspond to the middle line of the said street as above referred to.
