CHRISTMAS WEEK.—The week passed away—as do most of our weeks—without any unusual excitement. A pleasant little dance came off at Herling's—over the mountain—on Christmas eve. On Christmas morning, most of the saloons supplied the demands of thirsty customers,—without charge,—with egg-nogg, tom and jerry, &c.; and at night furnished sumptuous and beautiful lunches to all who were hungry. There was a lively party at the Forks of Jackson creek, Christmas night; so the boys from town report. The ball at Horne's last night, was the Grand Event of the holidays; was attended by a large and agreeable party of ladies and gentlemen; the supper was elegant—a feast for epicures; the dance was spiritedly continued till late in the morning, and closed without a single unpleasant occurrence. The vendors of toys reaped a harvest, and the money drawers of our saloons were filled with liberal contributions from all our citizens. Our town is noted for charity, yet notwithstanding our great vigilance, we failed to detect anybody taking a package to widows—or a basket to the orphans on—street, or any sort of gift for the relief or comfort of anyone. The charitable deeds of the week were very privately done.

STRUCK IT RICH.—We have seen some specimens from a vein of quartz that has recently been discovered, on Grave creek, four miles above the Grave Creek House, by Browning & Co., that is rich in both silver and gold. From various assays made, both at Portland and Jacksonville, it is estimated that the quartz will yield an average of \$82 to the ton. The lead is very extensive, and uniform in richness—paying about the same in each place tested. This ledge is near the line of Jackson and Douglas counties—but in the latter—and proves that all the good things of this section have not been taken.
