LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

A SLANDERER JUSTLY PUNISHED.—One Willis Hays has been engaged for some past in slandering the character of a lady residing on Slate creek, Josephine county. On Wednesday last, he had the impudence to call on her, and received a polite invitation to enter. He complied, when the door was quickly closed and locked; a cow hide of formidable dimensions produced, and the indignant woman "went for him," and administered a fearful castigation to the contemptible cur.
