SUCCESSFUL SURGERY—We witnessed, last Tuesday, a surgical operation—performed by Dr. L. T. Davis, at his private hospital in this place, assisted by Dr. W. Jackson, who administered the chloroform—upon the leg of a lad named Wm. Crump, about eighteen years old, residing near Sterlingville, in this county. The leg has been diseased for several years, with what is known in surgery as *Necrosis*—a rotting of the bone, causing large running sores in the flesh. The leg was opened, all the rotten parts of the bone removed and the leg bandaged, in about ten minutes. The lad went home on Thursday, and is doing well.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES—Regular Meeting, January 18, 1870. Members Present—A. Martin, President; Linn, Neil and Orth. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Liquor licenses were granted to P. D. Parson, Pape & Savage, Jno. Walters and J. Casey, and each assessed \$50 for six months. An order passed directing the Street Commissioner to improve the lower end of Cemetery road, and to make all necessary repairs on the same. Order passed for repairing the town hall—fixing the lining, putting in glass, &c., and the Marshal was authorized to see to it.

SELECT SCHOOL—The school taught at the District School House in this place, by Mr. J. L. De Bussche, has, since its opening, had rather a small attendance, on account of the prevalence of scarlet fever; but we are pleased to learn that now there are thirty-nine signers, and that the attendance is daily increasing. Scholars are received at this school at any time during the term, and only charged for the number of weeks they attend. Mr. De Bussche would be pleased to have parents visit his school, as often as once a week.

Dr. Tolman performed the operation at the residence of the lady. We learn that she is doing as well as can possibly be expected under the circumstances.

THE CEMETERY—We hope the proper authorities will take steps to have the walks and drives in the cemetery cleared of the growth of underwood, now encumbering them. In some portions of the grounds it is absolutely dangerous to take a team. The road leading up Cemetery hill should also be improved. The removal of the undergrowth and improvement of the road would add much to the beauty of this City of the dead.

ASHLAND—We learn from Mr. Downing, who visited us on last Thursday, that the Woolen Mills are running, and turning out some fine goods; that the Ashland House is prospering, and the town generally healthy and flourishing.

ANOTHER GONE—We are deeply pained to chronicle the death of another of Senator Miller's children, this week, from scarlet fever, making the fourth out of a family of six children. He and his family have the sincere sympathy of the entire community, although we know that no earthly condolence can assuage the bitter affliction which has visited his bereaved family.

PASSED AWAY—Mrs. Mary L. Carll, wife of Mr. Wm. Carll, died of consumption, at this place, on Wednesday last, after a lingering and painful illness, in the twentieth year of life. Mr. Carll, in his bereavement, has the sympathy of a sorrowing community.
