LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

Religious Notice.

Rev. M. A. Williams will hold divine service at the M. E. Church, to-morrow, at 11 o'clock.

COUNTY ROAD SURVEY.—The following "facts and figures," concerning the survey of the road from Jacksonville West, via Willow Springs, Rock Point and Louse Creek, to the county line, was furnished us by Surveyor Howard: Commenced at the intersection of California and Oregon streets, running on the old road to West end of Bybee's lane; thence turning to the right, by and through the lands of Kilgore and Armstrong, by Sears and Levers, and intersecting the old road at Thos. Wright's place, near the 5 mile post; thence by the old road to Willow Springs, 6 1/2 miles; to Dardanells, 11 miles; 12 miles to near Gall's creek. Here we turned to the right and followed the course of the river to the bridge at Rock Point—distance to White's store 13 1/2 miles—thence following the old road all the way to the county line. To Evans creek bridge, 19 1/2 miles; to Hunter's ferry, 23 1/2 miles; to Dry Diggings, 25 miles; to Croxton's Station, 28 1/2 miles; to Louse creek, 31 1/2 miles, and 32 miles and 68 rods to the county line.

SINGING CLASS.—A class in music will be formed next Wednesday evening, at the M. E. Church. Everybody is invited; and all can become members who wish, free of charge. Through the liberality of citizens here, enough money has been subscribed to procure books, and furnish light and fuel for the term. A series of lessons will first be given in the rudiments of music, after which the class will have regular rehearsals. This is a good way to spend an agreeable evening; and we are satisfied that everyone having a spark of music in his soul will respond to the call. The whole affair will be under the management of Mr. E. C. Brooks, one of the most competent teachers of music on the Coast.

DEBATING SOCIETY.—At a meeting of the Jacksonville Literary Society, held at the Town Hall, on last Monday night, the following officers were elected for the present term: Jas. D. Fay, President; T. H. B. Shipley, Vice; President; C. W. Kahler, Secretary, and H. Klippel, Treasurer. The Society meets every Monday night, at the Town Hall, and some question, chosen at the previous meeting, is debated; besides this, original speeches are made and essays read, upon various subjects. It is a most excellent plan for mental improvement, and we trust the Society may flourish and continue.

RICH QUARTZ.—We received, a few days since, some specimens of quartz, from the fish lead, recently discovered by Browning & Co. in this county. By a late assay made by M. A. King, of Portland, the following yield was obtained: silver, \$32 91; gold, \$87 84; total yield per ton, \$120 75. The ledge is about twenty-two inches in thickness. It has been claimed, and we so stated it in a previous notice,—that this ledge was in Douglas county; but it is now certain that the ledge lies in Jackson county.

OFFENDING CHINAMEN.—Two Chinamen was arrested this week—one for the unlawful carrying on of the "wood business," and the other for rash and untimely belligerent demonstrations. The first, who had in his possession a considerable amount of firewood, feloniously obtained,—was, on account of his prepossessing appearance, and well known industrious (?) habits, discharged. The other one, accused of "too much fight," was fined the "round sum" and turned loose.

RETURNED.—Sheriff Reames, who went to Portland with the insane man, Gardner, returned last Thursday, having had a somewhat slow and tedious trip.

SOCIAL HOP.—There will be a dance at Horne's Hall, on next Tuesday night. Music has been secured. Everybody, and their friends, are respectfully invited.
