COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.—February Term, 1870—L. J. C. Duncan, Judge—W. H. S. Hyde, Clerk.—The report of the viewers appointed to locate county road, from Jacksonville to Josephine county line, was presented, when J. W. Hays made complaint, and petitioned for damages to the amount of \$150, for running the road through his lands, and Isaac Constant, John Tepper and W. J. Plymale were appointed viewers to assess the damages.—Kasper Kubli was granted license for one year, for selling spirituous liquors at his place on Applegate.—W. Nus & Charles Schneider were granted license to keep a ferry on Klamath river, three miles below the Link river bridge, owned by George Nourse.—O. T. Brown, Dennis Crawley and A. J. Burnett appointed viewers, and James S. Howard surveyor, to locate a county road, to commence near Crawley's ranch on the Klamath river, and run east to Bloody Point, on the California line, via Lost river and Tule Lake. The following Road Supervisors have made reports, which have been accepted: Wm. Kahler, No. 12; J. S. Laey, No. 4; J. V. Ammerman, No. 2; Sam'l Rush, No. 13; James Miller, No. 17; Edwin Morgan, No. 14; A. J. Burnett, No. 31; Sam'l Furry, No. 15; M. H. Coleman, No. 3; Martin Peterson, No. 30; Thos. H. Avery, No. 21; A. J. Burnett, No. 31; O. W. Akers, No. 14; James Miller, No. 17; Sam'l Rush, No. 13; J. V. Ammerman, No. 2; Frederick Heber, No. 4; Wm. Kahler, No. 12; Wm. T. Lever, No. No. 8.

New Gang Plow.—Mr. D. C. Miller, of Jacksonville, has invented a new gang-plow, a specimen of which can be seen at his shop. It was put on trial, last week, and did good ploughing; but it needs regulating, and some slight alterations will be made in the machinery. This plow has several attractive features lacking in other plows; and it is the opinion of judges, having examined it carefully, that it will probably take precedence of all other inventions of the kind. Mr. Miller will apply for a patent.

A New Order.—A rumor is rife that a council of the "Improved Order of Red Men," is about to be established here. We know that efforts are being made in this direction. There exists no order of this kind in Oregon; but they are numerous throughout California. We know nothing of the workings or objects of this Order; only that they profess to "aid the afflicted, counsel the distressed, succor the feeble, watch with the sick and bury the dead."

COME TO TIME.—The law directs that the clerks of the several school districts shall report to the School Superintendent, on or before the 1st of March; and all districts failing to report, lose their appropriation of the school fund. District clerks will see the necessity for prompt action, as the time for making their report is brief.

LITERARY SOCIETY.—The question, before the Jacksonville Literary Society at their last meeting—namely, "Resolved, That Government should continue to grant public lands to aid in the construction of railroads,"—will be argued again at their meeting, next Monday evening.
