SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.—Tuesday evening 16th instant.—Present—A. Martin, President; D. Linn and John Orth; Mr. Neil absent. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Bills presented against the town: Geo. Brown, bill for wood for town, \$6; Charles Harris, bill for work repairing hall \$3. The bills were laid over. The Recorder, in the absence of Mr. Neil, presented an ordinance prepared by him, regulating and prescribing the duties of the Street Commissioner, requiring that all monies collected for road tax be paid into the Town Treasury, and to be drawn out on Town warrants, &c. The ordinance was read and favorably commented on by all the members present, but final action on the same was deferred till the next meeting of the Board. The annual election for town officers was ordered, and R. S. Dunlap, J. Roubush and Ad. Helms were appointed judges of the election, and Jas. R. Wade and C. W. Kahler Clerks. The Recorder was ordered to give legal public notice of said election to be held the first day of March next. The Board adjourned till the evening of 26th of February.

THE HOG CASE.—Somebody, way out on Link river, is charged with killing somebody else's hog; whereupon somebody else makes complaint. The swine-killer is arrested, witnesses from a hundred miles are summoned, and costs accrue and multiply, till the State is out and injured to the amount of \$500, or \$600; all for the sake of a little old hog or two. The people can stand it—the law must be sustained.

CIRCUIT COURT.—February Term, 1870. P. P. Prim, Judge, C. W. Kahler, Dist. Att'y, W. H. S. Hyde, Clerk. Court opened Monday with a light docket. The following cases were disposed of: T. G. Owen, for assault and battery, fined \$50 and costs; Cole, of Phoenix, selling liquors without a license, plead guilty, and fined \$50 and costs; State vs. Nus—for unlawfully killing hogs—case continued. Several divorce cases pending. Court will probably adjourn to-day.
