Religious Notice.

THE TWENTY SECOND.—No popular demonstration was made at this place, last Tuesday, in memory of him, whose name, high above all others, stands brightest and purest on the records of Time. Forgotten alike, is the Father of his country and his wise counsels. "Entangling Alliances" are being made from which their will be no extrication, and "Foreign Influences," are beginning to bear that will finally crush the nation. To close the celebration (?) of the Great Patriot's 138th birthday, Mr. Horne gave a ball at night, which was very poorly attended. On Tuesday morning two private individuals, with some of the old genuine article of the patriotism of '76 in their veins—both Democrats—ran up the once unsullied Stars and Stripes; which, refusing to "proudly wave," drooped and furled themselves about the flag-staffs, reserving, like latter-day patriots, their enthusiastic flutterings for the anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation, or adoption of the Fifteenth Amendment, which are so entirely eclipsing the old National Holidays of the Fourth of July, and the Twenty Second of February.

IMPROVED ORDER OF RED MEN.—Dr. Tolman, of Jacksonville, acting Vice Great Inchoance of the Great Council of the U. S., for the State of Oregon, at a called meeting held at the Hall of the I. O. O. F., on Thursday evening, Feb. 24th, organized Tribe No. 1 of this order for this state, to be known as Pocahontas Tribe. The following are the officers elected for this term: Sachem, Geo. B. Tolman, M. D.; Senior Sagamore, L. Ganung; Junior Sagamore, E. D. Watson; Chief of Revels, M. Mansor; Keeper of Wampum, T. G. Owen. This Tribe have a good Charter list, and from present appearances, it is the inauguration of an Order that will be a benefit to our citizens, and a credit to our State.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—Mr. Jacob Evans, of Pleasant creek, in this county, about twenty miles beyond Rock Point, on the other side of Rogue river, was seriously injured last Saturday by the caving in of a bank where he was mining. He was buried under the falling bank and had one leg very badly bruised, being broken above and also below the knee. It gives us pleasure to state that he is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.

SOME SPORT.—Considerable amusement was afforded the children of town, last Tuesday, by a valentine lottery, gotten up by Mr. J. M. Sutton. The town was canvassed for the names of all the children, who met at the Court House, where the valentines were drawn according to the most approved rules of lottery. "A little fun, now and then, is relished by the best of men," as well as young folks.

NEW PAPER.—We have received the prospectus of a paper, to be started at Roseburg, by Wm. Thompson, and to be called "The Plaindealer." It will be a faithful and fearless exponent of the principles of Democracy. Mr. Thompson's record as a worker in the Democratic party, heretofore, is known in Southern Oregon; and we trust he will receive their liberal patronage.

COURT ADJOURNED.—Circuit Court for this county—February term, 1870—adjourned last Saturday. Three divorce cases were before the court on that day, viz: Rebecca L. Hand vs. James Hand; Mary Smith vs. Benjamin Smith, and Nancy L. Stowe vs. Andrew J. Stowe, and a divorce was granted in each case.

CHANGED BASE.—Mr. Ed. De Pentt has left our town, and cast his lot with the good folks of Ashland. He will open there, in the boot and shoe business, where, being a good workman, and attentive to business, he will doubtless grow rich.

THE ROT.—The distemper, styled by one of our citizens the "Jacksonville Rot,"—by which nearly three fourths of the citizens of this valley have been afflicted, still rages. It is getting to be considered contagious; but though quite severe, not dangerous.

RACES TO-DAY.—There will be several races run this afternoon, at the Bybee race track. The principal race will be between the horses of Allen and Sizemore.

THE TOWN ELECTION.—Next Tuesday is the day set for the election of town officers. We recommend the following excellent ticket to the voters of Jacksonville: For Trustees, Neuman Fisher, J. R. Neil, David Linn, A. H. Martin and James Wilson; for Recorder, U. S. Hayden; for Treasurer, Henry Pape; for Marshal, Asher Wall; for Street Commissioner, P. Fehely. The big fight will be on the Marshalship, between Asher Wall and George Seeman. There have been unwearied efforts, on the part of Mr. Wall's enemies, in the circulation of groundless charges, the fabrication of slanderous reports, and the magnifying of trifles into errors of great magnitude; yet we believe that these underhand plottings will have but little influence upon the voters of Jacksonville; and that our citizens will evince their good judgment by re-electing Asher Wall, who, during two terms as Marshal, has proven himself equal to any emergency, attentive to his duties, and ever upright and courteous in his department.

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF RED MEN.—A number of persons met at the Odd Fellows Hall, last Sunday, for the purpose of forming a society of the Independent Order of Red Men. An organization was made by electing the following temporary officers: Herman Helms, Chairman; Henry Klippel, Treasurer, and Mr. Gassman, Secretary. To gain admission into this society a candidate must have these prerequisites; be a white man, speak German, and be a good absorbent of lager. The order numbers twenty-three members, and expects to receive its charter as soon as possible, and not later than the 31st of next December.
