LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

BORN BLIND.—There is a man at the hospital of Dr. Overbeck, who was born in Ireland, whose name is W. J. Johnson, and who has been blind from his birth. He came by car, from Missouri to Reno, where he was robbed of all the money he had—several hundred dollars. He managed to work his way to Oroville, Cal., and came a foot to this place, having a little boy to lead him. The heavy roads and rough weather were too much for him, and he is now an invalid at the County Hospital. Mr. Johnson is a well informed man and a pleasant conversationalist. He writes poetry—and has quite a volume of poems—many of which are pleasing; and some of them possess considerable merit. Mr. Johnson is not begging his way through the world; but endeavors to earn a livelihood by selling his poems. He has a new style of writing and reading for blind men; which is more simple and expeditious than the old plan of raised letters. The alphabet is somewhat similar to the telegraphic alphabet, but instead of dotting, is made by puncturing the paper with an instrument like an awl. The paper is punctured, turned over, and read off by passing the finger over the asperities. Mr. Johnson is desirous of getting to Portland, hoping that he can introduce his system into the Blind Man's Institute at that place. Persons visiting Mr. Johnson will be agreeably entertained; and can depart with the satisfaction of having helped to cheer and amuse a poor blind man.

THE FAIR.—The Fair to be given by the ladies of Jacksonville, will be held at Horne's Hall, on the evenings of the 20th and 21st of April. Admission the first evening will be free to all. On the second evening the admission will be 50 cents, when there will be vocal and instrumental music, and tableaux. Supper each night, 75 cents. All are invited to attend.

The stones are all for little children—ornamented with classic and beautiful engravings, elegantly lettered and finely finished. 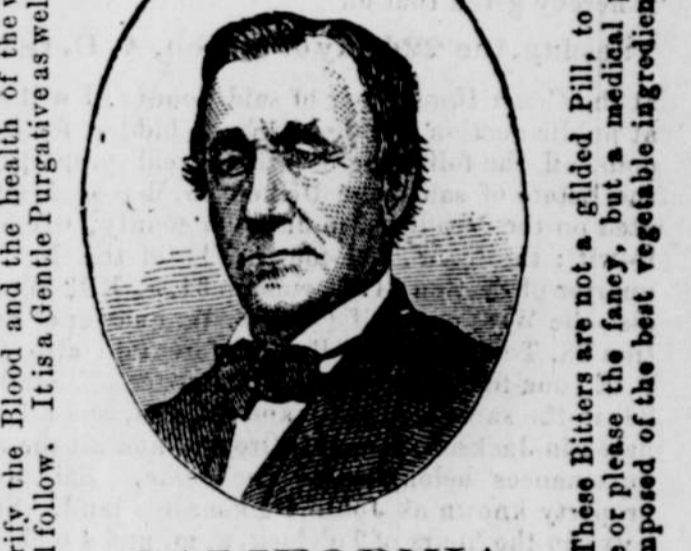
