LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

GOLD HILL.—The Gold Hill Quartz Mining Co. held a meeting at the famous Gold Hill, yesterday, H. Klippel, Pres't, N. C. Dean, Col. Ross, Sachs Bros., Tom Chavner and other stockholders, were in attendance. It is the intention of the company to resume operations upon this ledge, upon a more extensive scale than ever, and have the work begun at once. The object of the meeting yesterday was to make a new survey of the premises, and determine where the shaft should be sunk or the tunnels be started. The prevailing opinion is that the hill contains deposits as rich as those at first discovered; and the work will be prosecuted until they are struck, or the fact established that the lead has entirely run out.

STATE TAXES.—Mr. Max Muller, County Treasurer, started for Salem last Wednesday, with \$6,090 57, due the State as a part of her apportionment of the taxes collected in Jackson county; Sheriff Reames having previously paid in \$1,500, making a total of \$7,590 57. Of this amount, \$6,630 77 was property tax; \$855 was poll tax, and \$1,104 80 was for Chinese licenses.

FEEDING DEAD CHINESE.—On last Sunday the Chinese of this place, together with many wagon loads from adjacent camps, went through with the ceremony of feeding their dead brethren, buried in the Town Cemetery. From the amount of food and drink given to the dead, they will not be dry or hungry for some time.
