LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.—April term.—L. J. C. Duncan, Judge; W. H. S. Hyde, Clerk.—Among other proceedings, the following were had: On the petition of voters from Big Butte creek, the electoral precinct, called Big Butte creek precinct, was established, and place of voting fixed at Mountain School House.—On petition of voters of Table Rock precinct, the place of voting was changed from German's shop to the Antioch School House.—O. F. Brown's ferry license across Klamath river renewed for one year.—B. F. Wade appointed Supervisor for Road District No. 26.—The petition of Silas Draper, et al., for county road from Foot's creek, continued till May term.—The petition of J. B. White, et al., for county road from Rock Point to Josephine county line, on south side of Rogue river, continued till May term.—The petition of A. G. Rockfellow, et al., for county road from the stage road near Minus Walker's, to the Yandel claim in the Dead Indian country, continued till May term.—(The above road petitions were continued because of the unfavorable weather for surveying in April.)—The report of the viewers who located the road from Dennis Crawley's, on Link river, south to California line, was adopted, and the road established.—Simeon McKee, adm'r of the estate of Johnathan Woody, dec'd, made final settlement on the 7th inst.—John Hockenjos appointed adm'r of the estate of Henry S. Hughes, who died at Auburn, Baker county, in 1863.—Court adjourned to Saturday.

THE FAIR.—The Fair to be given by the ladies of Jacksonville, will be held at Horne's Hall, on the evenings of the 20th and 21st of April. Admission the first evening will be free to all. On the second evening the admission will be 50 cents, when there will be vocal and instrumental music, and tableaux. Supper each night, 75 cents. All are invited to attend. The proceeds of the Fair will be donated to the Sisters of J. and M. towards paying the debt incurred by the purchase of the Drum property.

SCHOOL MEETING.—At the meeting held at the School House in Jacksonville last Saturday, Judge P. P. Prim was elected School Director, for a term of three years, and Silas J. Day, Clerk, for one year. We consider both very excellent selections. The amount of cash reported on hand by the clerk, was \$640, and the amount on delinquents list \$144. There are several applicants for the school, but the fortunate one has not been named, nor have we learned when the school will be opened.

WATER PRIVILEGES.—As our suggestion relative to the "frog pond" failed to engage the attention of our town guardians, we now respectfully call their attention to the swamp lands, contiguous to, and extending westwardly from said pond, as far as Oregon streets. We submit that those "lands," besides marring the beauty of our town, emit offensive and unhealthy odors. What shall be done with them?

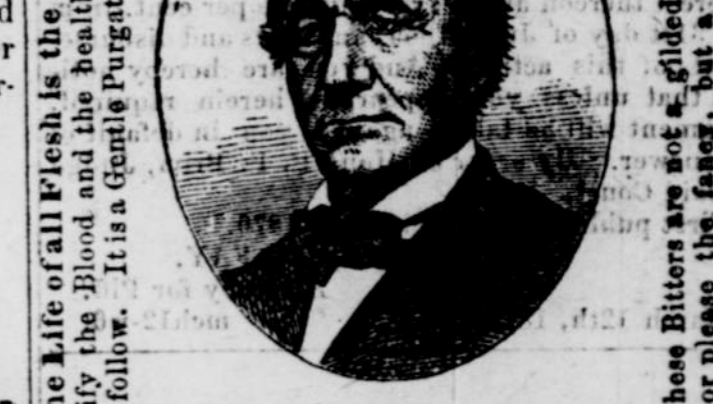
