Democratic County Convention.

By resolution of the Democratic County Central Committee held in Jacksonville, April 24, 1870, the Democratic County Convention for nominating a County Ticket will be held in Jacksonville on Saturday, May 7th, 1870.

Table listing delegates from various precincts: Ashland, Butte Creek, Evans Creek, Forest Creek, Grants Pass, Klamath, Manzanita, Sterlingville, Union Town, Applegate, Elen, Flourence Rock, Fooths Creek, Jacksonville, Leland, Rock Point, Table Rock, Willow Springs.

The Committee have decided upon the voting for J. S. Smith in 1868, as a test entitling voters to participate in the Precinct meetings, who resided in the county at that time.

The Committee ask the Democracy of the various Precincts to turn out in mass, and send up to the County Convention their best men.

The Radical Ticket.

The Portland Convention of the 6th inst. has placed a ticket in the field which is neither complimentary to the intelligence of the party which nominated it or to the people of the State.

Joseph G. Wilson, the candidate for Congress, is at present Judge of the 5th Judicial District, a position which, we understand, he has not resigned, although he has accepted the nomination for Congress.

"I, Joseph G. Wilson, do solemnly swear, or affirm, that I will support the Constitution of the State of Oregon; and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of a Judge of the Supreme and Circuit Courts of said State according to the best of my ability; and that I will not accept any other office, except Judicial office, during the term for which I have been elected."

We feel assured that Wilson will not accept the office of Representative, in the sense of enjoying the honors and emoluments of the position, for he has as surely "gone where the woodbine twineth," as if the 6th of June had already come, and the dolorous trip up Salt river commenced.

Before the war Wilson was a radical democrat of the straitest sect, although, we believe, he bolted the pominations of both Stout and Sheil. Since the war, he has aspired to the position of being the leader of the negro-worshippers in this State. A few years ago, a couple of negroes were married in Salem, and Judge Wilson being then in Salem, attending the Supreme Court, accepted the position of master of ceremonies at the wedding feast, kissed the bride, and made himself generally useful as the chief adviser in regard to the table arrangements.

Gen. (?) Joel Palmer is the candidate for Governor, and the Convention perpetrated a stupendous joke when it nominated him upon an anti-reputation platform; for when Palmer was superintendent of Indian Affairs in Oregon at the commencement of the Indian war of 1855-6, he did more to cause the reputation of the Oregon War Debt, than did Gen. Wool himself.

Oregon. He denounced them as murderers, mercenaries, thieves, reckless incendiaries, who were instigating the war in order to make a profit out of it. On the other hand, the Indians were represented as the most peaceful people on earth, who were being slaughtered without mercy while begging for peace, and were only driven to resist after repeated outrage.

Independent Movement.

During the week there have been some developments made of a political character, that are truly startling indeed. Independence has been the battle-cry; and the scribbler for the Sentinel, is around, approaching men of democratic proclivities, pledging them the all-powerful support and influence of the Sentinel, if they will only accept a place upon the ticket about to be warmed into life by himself and Dick Moore.

With proper management the ratification of this amendment will give us in Oregon 200 colored votes, and elect the entire Republican ticket at the June election. At the Presidential election Grant only lacked 164 votes of getting the electoral vote of Oregon.

This is the reason why Democrats howl for a "white man's government;" and this is one reason why we favor the Fifteenth Amendment. Our colored population show they deserve to be enfranchised by voting against rebels and democrats.

Letter From Klamath.

EDITOR DEMOCRATIC NEWS:—The Democracy of this part of Jackson county have just learned of the action of our State Convention, and every one feels well satisfied with the ticket for Congress and State officers; and all we want now is a good county ticket, and old Klamath will roll up a good majority for the good old cause of democracy at the June election.

We have had the pleasure of a visit,—the first I believe of the season, from a small man that has had the misfortune at sometime or other of losing an arm, which is to be pitied. Still this man is one of the most radical we have ever chanced to meet, although we have traveled the Pacific coast over and over again; "though he bangs bob-tail," he surely must have emanated from our good old Radical that blows the Sentinel bellows, from Washington.
