## LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

### Religious Notice.

**ROMANTIC AND OTHERWISE.**—Our readers will remember old "Fifteenth Amendment," alias Al. Johnson, who ran so well at the races, some weeks ago. Well, just as we expected, "Fifteenth Amendment" has got himself into fresh trouble. He became smitten with another "cullud gemman's" daughter, down the valley, a rather pretty copper-colored maid of tender thirteen, visited her, contrary to her parents wishes, poured sweet nonsense into her ears, and by his winning eloquence induced the unsophisticated maid to desert her father's roof and come to Jacksonville. Hither the exasperated parent followed; and finding his lost darling at "Colored headquarters," then and there administered to her a severe castigation, and sent her home. But true to her vows of love she fled again and met her swarthy lover, who bore her away from the busy scenes of city life into the mountains. And they sojourned a day and night in the chaparral. Her sorrowing father came again, and failing to discover his truant child, and caring the worst, had an attachment issued for the arrest of Johnson, who he supposed had his daughter in keeping. After diligent search the Sheriff found the happy but erring pair, on Wednesday evening, in the hills south of town. The girl was put in charge of her father who started her for home, and "Fifteenth Amendment" was committed to the County Jail, where he is now awaiting an examination on the charge of abduction.

**JACKSONVILLE SCHOOLS.**—This school will be opened next Monday week. We understand that the Directors have engaged Mr. J. L. DeBusche and Mrs. McCully as teachers; leaving it optional with parents as to which teacher they will send their children,—each teacher to have entire control of, and be responsible only for his, or her own class. This arrangement certainly leaves no reasonable room for dissatisfaction; and we therefore trust that each teacher will have a full class, and that the school may go on in its wonted harmonious and prosperous style.

**THE WILLOW SPRINGS BALL.**—A ball was given at the School House near Willow Springs, on the 8th inst., for the benefit of school district No. 14, whereby the district realized about \$100. Some fifty couples, representing all parts of the county, were in attendance. The dance was continued at the School House, till near the break of day; the entire party retiring to the house of Mr. McCoy, at 12, where a splendid supper was served. We have heard but one expression in regard to the affair—namely, that "it was a splendid ball."

**COMING EVENTS.**—The Ladies Fair, to be given by the ladies of Jacksonville, at Horne's Hall, commences next Wednesday. The Old Fellow's Ball will be given at Horne's Hall, next Tuesday week, 26th. The Democratic primary meetings will be held at the several precincts, on Saturday, April 30th. The Democratic County Convention for nominating a county ticket will be held at Jacksonville, May 7th. The election of the entire Democratic State Ticket will take place on the 6th day of June next.

**A FRAGMENT.**—A piece of gold weighing about \$40, found on Footh creek, was on exhibition in town, this week, that is supposed to have been broken off the small end of a large nugget, horn-shaped, (?) and weighing about 100 pounds. The shape, general appearance, and the position it occupied when found, clearly indicate that it is a fragment, and a heavy force of night and day hands will be put on the lead, to search for the main chunk.

**PUBLIC SALES.**—The sale, at auction, of the personal property of the estate of J. L. Stearnes, takes place to-day, as also the sale of the Arkansas livery stable. The household and kitchen furniture of John S. Drum, and the real estate of James R. Pool, dec'd, will be sold at auction, next Saturday.

**HEAVY RAINS.**—The steadiest and heaviest rain that has fallen here for near two years, commenced on last Sunday night, and continued to pour down, almost without cessation, until Tuesday. The creeks were full, and good "sluice-heads" could be had in gulches that had been dry for years.

**AGREED.**—It has been proposed that a meeting be held, shortly, to ratify the nomination made by the Post Office Department at Jacksonville—viz: James M. Sutton, for Sheriff. We can see no impropriety in the ratification, by his friends, of the nomination, if only as a precedent.

**A NEW PAPER.**—We have received the prospectus of the "Bedrock Democrat," a weekly Democratic paper, soon to be started at Baker City, Oregon, by Abbott & McArthur. Judging from its title, its politics will be sound.

Stanley, Manzanita, No. 6; No. 3 has been abolished and attached to No. 6, the Superintendent having received a petition to that effect, properly signed, by voters of both districts; Miss Jennie Caton, Dardanelles, No. 17; Miss Belle Colver, No. 8; Miss Emma Beach, Wagner creek, No. 22; Miss Maggie Hutchison, No. 10; Miss Annetta Gore, North Phoenix, No. —. Several precincts are yet without teachers.
