CAN THEY VOTE NEXT JUNE ?- There is a section in the Constitution of Oregon which provides that no free negro or mulatto, not residing in this State at the time of the adoption of this Consticution shall come and reside or be within the State, &c., &c., and that the Legislative Assembly shall provide by penal laws, &c., &c., f.r the enforcement of that section. No law was ever passed, we believe, to enforce that section, and as it was claimed that Constitutional provisions do not enforce themselves, no attempt was ever made to prevent negroes from coming to and residing in the State. Now the question we suggest just now is, HATVAG GNV HARLDVHANV that the Fitteenth Amendment (so-called) to the Constitution of the United States is in the same category with the provision in that of this State. which we have quoted from. In both cases, legislation to enforce the article is mentioned, and if one does not enforce itself, why should the other? The conclusion seems to be, then, that in the absence of any law to enforce the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, it must remain inoperative, and, consequen ly, negroes cannot vote in Oregon next June. Let the lawyers argue this question, and begin now, as important results may follow its determination .-
