The Committee has decided upon the voting for J. S. Smith in 1868, as a test entitling voters to participate in the Precinct meetings, who resided in the county at that time.

The Committee ask the Democracy of the various Precincts to turn out in mass, and send up to the County Convention their best men.

The Word White to be Stricken from the Naturalization Laws.

The Radical platform of Oregon contains a resolution which pledges the party to oppose all change in the naturalization laws, by which no other foreigners than those already mentioned in the law can become citizens of the United States.

WASHINGTON, March 23, 1870. DEAR SIR: It is with a feeling of shame that I am aware that the discrimination in favor of white men still lingers in our naturalization laws.

I have introduced a bill to strike out this last relic of former days, and it is now before the Judiciary Committee awaiting their report.

It will thus be seen that a bill is now pending before Congress to strike the word "white" from the naturalization laws. CAN THEY VOTE NEXT JUNE?—There is a section in the Constitution of Oregon which provides that no free negro or mulatto, not residing in this State at the time of the adoption of this Constitution shall come and reside or be within the State, &c., &c., and that the Legislative Assembly shall provide by penal laws, &c., &c., for the enforcement of that section.
