**THE BLIND MAN.**—W. J. Johnson, the blind man, who has been stopping at Dr. Overbeck's hospital, left Wednesday night, for his home in St. Louis; and below will be found his adieu to the citizens of Jacksonville:

I feel it a duty, which I owe to the good citizens of Jacksonville, to offer to them, in sincere and heartfelt thanks, for their great kindness in contributing to me means sufficient to take me to my home in St. Louis. The amount I received is \$250. I shall forever feel grateful to Dr. A. B. Overbeck—not only for collecting this money, but also for the kind attention he paid me while under his treatment. I also feel very much indebted to Mr. Comstock of the California Stage Co., who kindly consented to pass me to Sacramento for half fare. I will avail myself of this opportunity of thanking the kind ladies who visited me during my sickness. They no doubt realized, in a measure, what the feelings must be of one who sits, mantled in everlasting darkness, enduring sickness and pain, and over 2,000 miles from his home and relatives. I deeply regret being compelled to appeal to the benevolence of the people of Jacksonville, which I would not have had occasion to do, had it not been for the cruel treatment I received, from two heartless villains, on the 28th of last July; who, after robbing me of all the money I had, \$277 50, threw me into the Truckee river; from which, after repeated efforts, I succeeded in escaping; not, however, without taking with me a severe cold which settled on my lungs, and which was the foundation of my recent illness.

**A GREAT DISCOVERY.**—Mr. Green Linville brought to town, this week, a mineral which he discovered on Batte creek, and which he supposed to be Borax. Mr. J. M. Sutton put the strange mineral through a chemical process, and produced a pure article of crystallized epsom salts. The crude mineral, Mr. Linville says, exists in exhaustless quantities; which, according to Mr. Sutton's analysis, yields seventy-five per cent. pure salts. The mineral can be readily obtained, and reduced to the pure article easily, and with less trouble and expense than is required to make common salt.
