The same was read and referred to a special committee, Neil and Fisher, with instructions to report a bill. Repairs and alterations of Town Hall, enlarging the room, tearing down the chimney and other improvements, was suggested, and Neil, Wilson and Fisher were made a special committee to examine and report upon the same.

Mr. Wilson suggested the propriety of the town adopting some badge to be worn by the Town Marshal, and Mr. Wilson and Neil were appointed a committee on the same. Board adjourned without day.
