LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

SAN FRANCISCO DIRECTORY.—We have received this work, compiled by H. G. Langly, for 1870, being a complete directory of residents, and business directory of San Francisco, and containing a map of that city. Every business man on the Coast should have this work. Mr. Langly will issue, in July next, the second volume of the Pacific Coast Business Directory, which will contain the names, business and address of over thirty thousand merchants, manufacturers and professional men of California, Oregon and Nevada, together with an exhibit of the resources of the Pacific Coast.
