LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

Mining and Irrigating Water Ditch.

Articles of incorporation of the Applegate and Jacksonville Mining and Irrigation Water Ditch Company will be filed in the Clerk's office in a day or two, with the following gentlemen as incorporators. Dr. Geo. B. Tolman, Jas. T. Glenn, Jacob Ish and Wm. Bybee. The capital stock of the company will be \$100,000, in shares of \$100. San Francisco capitalists have already pledged themselves for \$40,000 of the stock, which makes the stock about half taken; and so soon as the balance is taken work on the ditch will be commenced. This enterprise was undertaken several years ago, under a charter by the Legislature; but failed for lack of means to carry it out. Three miles of the ditch, however, was nearly completed by the old company—Maury and others—the dam partially built for turning the water in, levels run, estimates of fluming all made, &c., &c. Dr. Tolman and others have bought out this old company, and propose to push the work to an early completion. The ditch will carry twenty-five solid feet of water; and will supply Forest creek, Jackson creek, Willow Springs, and nearly all the mines in this portion of the county. The completion of this ditch will have opened a new era—golden one—in Jackson county; and we look anxiously forward to the commencement of the work, and trust that citizens will not long allow the stock to be untaken.

A LIVELY EVENING.—On last Saturday evening, according to announcement, Jas. D. Fay and others addressed the citizens of Jacksonville, in front of Horre's Hotel, closing the campaign in Jackson county. A great number from the country remained in town to hear the several orators in their last effort of the most exciting canvass ever known in the county. An immense bonfire and the "booming anvils," served as notice of the place of meeting. In the meantime the fusion candidates arranged for speaking at the corner of California and Oregon streets, when a large fire was soon burning, and the brassband playing their liveliest airs. Messrs. Langell, Kahler and others held forth at this stand, while Fay, Shipley and Klippel were addressing the people in front of Horre's. The speeches were good and the cheering frequent and spirited. Speaking continued till nearly 11 o'clock. Mr. Fay's speech alone occupied one and a half hour's time.

NEGRO VOTERS.—The "colored element" of this precinct was fully voted—old "Fifteenth Amendment" who always runs ahead of his ticket, among the rest. The air of importance with which those ebionies deposited their ballots, could not fail to strike the beholder with awe and admiration. Some of them voted the straight Democratic ticket, some, the straight Fusion, while others scratched. Nigger voters! Next the Chinaman, then the Esquimaux, and finally the gorilla.

VERY ORDERLY.—Contrary to the fears of many the election went off quietly and in good order, with the exception of one knock down, which occurred between two gentlemen from the country. The fight was fierce but of brief duration. One of the gentlemen retired from the scene of conflict in good order, but sadly discomfited.

FOR THE EAST.—Dr. Overbeck and family left by stage, last Wednesday night, to visit their friends in Missouri. He will return about the first of next August. Doctors Greenman and Ganung will have charge of the County Hospital until Dr. Overbeck returns.

A FINE SCHOOL.—The attendance of pupils at District School No. 1, taught by Professor DeBusche and Mrs. McCully, is about one hundred. The fact that not a single complaint has been heard this term, is sufficient evidence that both parents and pupils are well satisfied.

CLOSED.—The camp meeting at Heber's Grove, conducted by Reverend Royal, Alderson and others, closed last Sunday. Preachers and campers have gone to Josephine to hold a meeting there.

QUARTZ.—Mr. Bowden has about eighty tons of rich quartz, which he is having hauled to the Occidental mill to be crushed. The mill will be started in a day or two.

ELECTED.—The entire Democratic county ticket, with the exception of School Superintendent, was elected last Monday.

ON THE MEND.—A party of men are engaged in repairing the Telegraph line—re-setting posts, &c.

Just after the Owen-Jackson affair, the columns of B. F. Dowell's paper were filled weekly with the bitterest vilification of T. G. Reames and T. G. Owen. Public opinion was attempted to be influenced in every possible way, in order to send the latter individual to the penitentiary. The firm of Dowell & Watson was retained to assist the Dist. Att'y in the prosecution; and a prosecution, not a prosecution, of the case was had. Yet, at the last election Reames and all the Owen's brothers voted a ticket gotten up at the dictation of this same B. F. Dowell. "Can such things be, and overcome us like a summer cloud, without our special wonder?"

Bill Ish boastingly asserted that he had a vote in reserve in this county of which no one dreamed. The villainous transactions at Goose Lake prove what that vote was. A Capt. in the U. S. Army, who is a disgrace to the uniform he wears, stationed at Camp Warner, in Baker county, voted nineteen of his soldiers in uniform—stood at the polls and made them vote the Fusion ticket; and five of Bill Ish's haymakers, on his ranch in Warner Valley, also voted. Bill Greenman, Dr. Greenman's brother, was on the board of Judges, which accounts probably for the facility with which those illegal votes were permitted.
