## LOCAL INTELLIGENCE

### Religious Notice.

Rev. C. Alderson will hold divine services at the M. E. Church, to-morrow, at 10 o'clock.

**SNAKE BITTEN.**—We are informed by Mr. S. B. Hull that on last Wednesday week, near Frounce Rock, two of Mr. Uriah Gordon's little girls were bitten by a rattlesnake. They were crossing an oat field, with their father, who was in advance, when the first girl exclaimed, "Oh! I've snagged my foot;" and the second girl stepping in the same place, uttered the same exclamation. Both were barefooted, and both were struck on the same foot, just below the ankle bone. In a moment their tongues began to swell, vomiting commenced, and the eldest had to be carried home. They were made to drink freely of good whiskey, while poultices, made of the rattlesnake weed, were applied to the wounds. They suffered severely for several days, but are now recovering.

**PIPE LAYING.**—Messrs. Reames and Wilson have laid a string of water pipe, from the factory of Linn & Hall, to their Livery stables; which they expect will supply them with all the water needed. Mr. B. F. Dowell is laying pipe from the spring under the Drug Store to his residence. The pipe will run under this office; and the rumor reaches us that we are to be undermined or blown up. No credence is given to the rumor, however, as we have it from Mr. Dowell that if undermined or blown up, he will set us up all right again. We presume this act of kindness on the part of Mr. Dowell, is induced by his love of "cheap advertising."

**A HIGH FALL.**—A party of boys were going home from school, on Friday, July 1st, they discovered a crow's nest high up in a tree. One of the boys, about seven years old, son of J. N. Woody, who resides near Phoenix, nimbly ascended the tree and reached the nest; when his hold broke and he fell a distance of forty feet, breaking his thigh bone. His mind was deranged for several days after the accident; but we are informed by Dr. Davis, the attending surgeon, that the boy's mind is right again, and that he is doing well.

**ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.**—A man by the name of Christo Dore accidentally shot himself, at the copper mines, on the Illinois river, in Josephine county, on the 21st inst. He attempted to take his gun from a boat by the muzzle, and in doing so, discharged it, the contents carrying away a portion of the bone of the right arm. Dr. R. E. Foley amputated the arm at the shoulder, on the 3d inst., and says he left the wounded man doing well on the 4th.

**ONE MORE.**—As we have recorded but five accidents this week, we will mention one more: A man who had just "come the plains across," drove off the bridge, in crossing Wall's creek, below Rock Point, and broke both bones of his right leg, just above the ankle. Our informant did not learn the unfortunate man's name.

**PROSPECTING.**—A party of seven or eight men started this week, with plenty of provisions, tools, etc., for a prospecting tour to the headwaters of the Umpqua. If the expedition does not prove profitable, it will at least be more pleasant than remaining here during the hot season.

**DITCH SCRAVER.**—Dr. Tolman and party will begin the preliminary survey of the Applegate and Jacksonville mining and irrigating water ditch, to-day. As soon as this is done, an engineer from San Francisco will make a final and accurate survey, and a force be put to work upon the ditch.

**ROCK POINT.**—Our neighbors of Rock Point had a celebration on the Fourth; and manifested their patriotism by reading the Declaration of Independence, orating, &c. Mr. Wm. Fidler, of this place, delivered the oration. A Ball at White's Hotel closed the festivities.

**ICE CREAM.**—Our energetic Post Master, who believes in keeping cool, will furnish ice cream to customers two days in the week, viz., Wednesdays and Saturdays. Ice cold soda water can be had at all times, at the Post office building.

**SPRINKLE THE STREETS.**—What has become of the Street Sprinkler? If there ever was a time when it was needed, that time is now. Bring it out.

**APPOINTED.**—E. D. Foudray has been appointed Deputy Sheriff, and J. W. Crutcher Deputy Clerk.

The degree of heat endured has ranged from 104 to 110, in the shade—last Sunday being the hottest day.

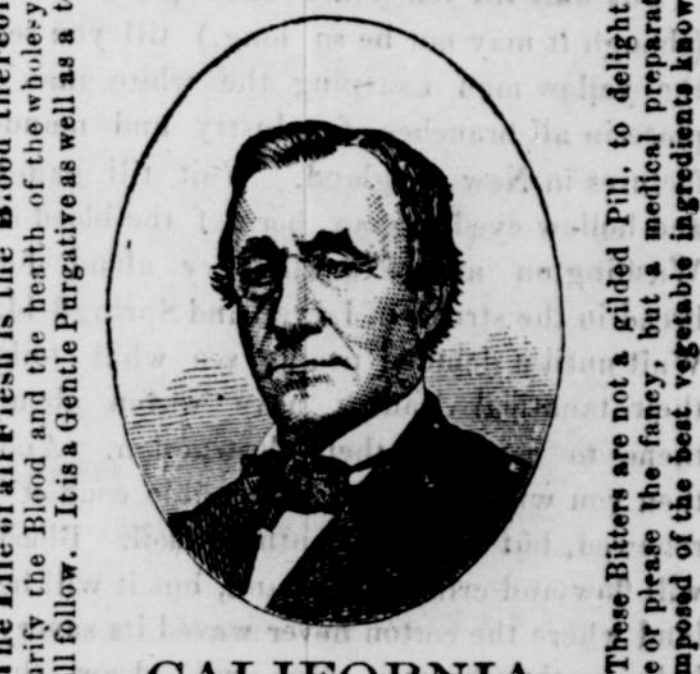
