

The Coolie Question.

It is reported that, on Umpqua river, near Scottsburg, the house of Capt. Hathaway was destroyed by fire on the 6th, inst., and that his charred remains were afterwards found in the cellar.

Ben. Holladay, A. M. Loryea, J. B. Stevens and H. Boyd, are the incorporators of a new gas and water company, at Portland. They propose to furnish East Portland with light, and both Portlands with water. Capital stock, \$500,000.

A cattle drover was robbed a few nights since, in the city of Portland.

The contract for supplying the State with stationary has been let to J. K. Gill, of Salem.

The materials, of Berah Brown's paper, the Press, has been purchased by the Christian denomination, who intend publishing a paper at Monmouth, Polk county.

General News.

The late massacre of Christians, at Pekin, included a French Count, several Priests and Sisters of Mercy, and a number of Russians. Maj. G. Wright, who burned the barracks at Harper's Ferry, where Mills surrendered, died at San Francisco on the 8th, inst.

A brick maker in Pittsburg, Pa., is about to come into possession of an old estate in England, valued at \$250,000,000.
