LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

SOMEWHAT MYSTERIOUS.—In November, last, we noticed the disappearance of a boy from the ranch of Mr. T. Jackson, on Rogue river, to whom the missing boy had been bound as an apprentice. The boy, after being missed, was traced to the river, and was supposed to have been drowned in attempting to cross. We learn now, that the dogs belonging to the ranch of Hon. J. N. T. Miller, which is on the opposite side of the river to Jackson, were found, about two weeks ago, with the leg and thigh bones, attached, of a boy corresponding in size with those of the missing boy. About the same time the men on Mr. Miller's ranch noticed an offensive smell on the bank of the river, and that numerous carrion birds had collected about the place. The men notified Mr. Jackson of the matter, and told him he had better come over and bury the bones; he said he would, but up to latest accounts had failed to do so. There seems to be but little doubt that these are the remains of the lost boy. If so, was the boy drowned? If drowned, how came his remains to be buried on the bank of the river, where they remained till recently dug up by the dogs. This is certainly an affair that deserves the immediate and thorough investigation of the authorities having jurisdiction in such matters. Since the above information was put in type, we learn that other parties claim that the bones found, were the bones of a bear. Still the matter should certainly be investigated.

THE BIG FOLKS.—The Museum of Living Wonders, were on exhibition at Horne's Hall, last Monday evening. The giant and giantess were huge indeed. BURGLARY.—Whilst Joseph Rantz, of galls creek, was enjoying the Fourth of July, at Rock Point, a celestial from the Flowery Kingdom forced the door of his cabin and robbed it of clothing and blankets to the value of \$87.50. After a hearing before his Hon. Lafayette Gall J. P., of Rock Point Precinct, he was committed in default of bail to await the action of the Grand Jury of Jackson county. He was brought to this place on Tuesday last, and lodged in jail.
