Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees held a regular meeting on Tuesday eve., 19th inst. Present—Neil, Fisher and Wilson. Absent—A. Martin and the President. The meeting was called to order and Jas. R. Neil chosen President pro tem. The minutes of the previous meeting being read and approved, the Committee on repairs and improvements of Town building made their report, recommending that the hall or room be enlarged by removing the partition and chimney altogether, and extending the room in the rear to the prisoner's cell wall, and making a general improvement of the front part of the building, enlarging the doors and windows, &c. Committee on the petition, praying that an ordinance be passed prohibiting animals from wearing bells and running at large in night time, reported favorably to the same, and reported a bill for that purpose which was read the first time. The Committee on the adoption of a distinctive badge for City Marshal, said they were not ready to report, and further time was allowed. The Town Treasurer presented his quarterly report, which was read and referred. The report shows receipts from all sources for this quarter, \$313 50 currency, and \$129 coin. Warrants paid \$248 50 coin. Total amount in Treasury, July 19th, \$343 currency and \$339 76 coin. The Town Treasurer's corrected bill for \$31 93 was presented and referred. The Town Marshal presented a bill of \$30 50 for killing dogs and removing dead animals, &c., which was referred to Finance Committee. The Street Commissioner laid before the Board a communication from Mrs. Mahala Smith, who complains that the Applegate road, as now traveled, runs off the true laid out road over her premises, and asks that the road be changed, she having a Town deed for her land; and if not relieved, she will be compelled to sue the Corporation. The communication was laid on the table. The Chair called the attention of the Board to the many complaints made of the nightly disturbances, by Chinese, at the China house on California street. Other members remarked that they believed the Marshal had full power in the premises to suppress the disturbances, and refused to take any action on the subject at present. The Board then adjourned to Thursday evening, the 28th inst.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—Mr. S. Hall, of the firm of Jinn & Hall, of this place, met with a serious accident on Wednesday last. Mr. Hall was fixing some part of the planing machine which was at the time in full speed, and in trying to pass between some boxes and the planer, caught his left hand in the knives, which cut out the knuckle joint of the forefinger, and split that of the third. Dr. L. Ganunz was called, and gave the necessary surgical aid. We are pleased to state that Mr. Hall is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances.
