LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

[Reported for DEMOCRATIC NEWS.]

Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees met pursuant to adjournment on the 28th inst. Present—Neil, Fisher and Wilson. Absent—Martin and President Linn. Mr. Neil was chosen President *pro tem*. The minutes of the last meeting were read. On motion, of Mr. Fisher, the bill entitled Ordinance 50, to prohibit animals wearing bells from running at large at night time, was called up and after some amendments, was read a second time and returned to the table. The Town Treasurer's quarterly report made at the last meeting was found incorrect and returned, and a corrected report was made and accepted and put on file, showing amount of funds on hand to July 19th, to be \$348 50 currency and \$289 76 coin. The committee on badge for Marshal made a report and recommended a Star be adopted, which was read and accepted. Bills ordered paid: G. O. Seaman's bill, \$30 50; Town Treasurer's bill, \$31 93. Total \$62 43. The Marshal presented John Neuber's bill for making badge, \$8; refer red. The Recorder was directed to notify persons whose licenses were about to expire. License to retail liquors and for billiards was granted to Pape & Savage. A petition from John Weiss and 16 others was presented and read, for the opening of Oregon Street through to the corporation's south line, and for vacating the now traveled Applegate road, &c., and for opening Third Street through, and vacating the Sterling road as now traveled inside of corporation line, &c., was laid on the table. A Martin was granted leave of absence for 15 days.

Etc.—No items of great moment have come under our notice this week to record. A great many arrivals and departures for the mountains might be chronicled.—Judge Prim and lady returned from a short stay at Soda Springs and several of the town's people are still up there.—Mr. Back Pymale, and Mr. J. R. Neil and others propose starting for the mountains, with their families, the first of next week.—The Hon. Jas. D. Fay left for Portland and when last heard from was on his way to Frisco by steamer.—Farmers are generally very busy taking care of the ripened grain. Much grain will be lost through the inability of harvesters to cut it as soon as it is ripe. Threshing-machines and headers are being run about 16 hours a day, and then do not meet the demands of the season.—Warm weather has settled into uniformity, and the Thermometer stands at near 100° each day in the week.—Watermelons, the first of the season, made their appearance in town on Thursday.

THE DITCH.—If commendable perseverance and confidence in one's own self are to be taken as indications of success, then we are really to have a ditch. Doc. Geo. B. Tolman is untiring and indefatigable in his efforts to have the thing inaugurated, and if the capital which he avers has been promised him from below is forthcoming, a new era will be ushered in upon Southern Oregon. If we have a ditch, they can take the railroad where they please. This part of the country can be rendered almost self-sustaining within itself, if only our wealthy advantages are properly developed. The Doctor left on last Thursday to make a permanent survey of the proposed ditch, taking with him seven men, and provisions sufficient to last them two or three weeks.

CIRCUS.—Judging from the looks of the hand-bills and from notices in our exchanges, our circus going part of the community will be treated to something more than ordinarily when Dan Castillo's performance reaches this place. The 9th of August is the day fixed for its arrival, when all those having an extra dollar in their breecheslooms may see the fun. It is claimed to be the largest traveling circus and menagerie on earth. Go and see it. This Company will perform at Rock Point, Wednesday, August 10th.

RAILROADS.—Remember this is the day for C. J. W. W. Chapman to address us on railroad matters—a subject upon which Oregon is at present intensely interested just now.

Latest European War News.

BERLIN.—A detachment of French troops, consisting of 3 companies of infantry and eighty horsemen, attacked half of a Prussian regiment of infantry at Vockingern. French were repulsed with the loss of one officer and eight men; only one Prussian soldier wounded.

NEW YORK, 29.—Captain Samuels, of the Dauntless, has mysteriously disappeared. It is reported that he has lost \$30,000 on the race, and has suicided.

LONDON.—Bank of England has raised rate of interest to 5 per cent. Many additional failures yesterday. Reversion Howell and Crabtree, wool dealers—Bradford—and largely interested in American trade, stopped yesterday; also several failures at stock exchange in this city, and at Cotton market, at Liverpool. Business is nearly entirely suspended. Line broke right here.
