THE CIRCUS PERFORMANCE.—When expectancy is too much excited we are apt to undervalue what otherwise might be considered a rare treat. Such were the circumstances under which a great many witnessed the "largest show on earth," Tuesday evening. The performance, as a whole, gave pretty general satisfaction, and the circus proprietor has reason to congratulate himself upon his success as an advertiser. The seats were all completely packed, and if the exhibition was not all that had been anticipated, it was, nevertheless, very good. It is mainly the old show with the additional feature of performing Arabs. The lions are the same that were here before.

PROSPECTORS RETURNED.—The crowd of miners who left town some five or six weeks since to search for diggings on the headwaters of Umpqua and adjoining streams, returned Monday evening. They report a rough country to travel over and but little gold. An abundance of game, however, was found out in that direction, and the boys had the pleasure of killing a great many deer and a large sized elk. We have not learned whether they found the "lost cabin" or not. The latter, we trust, is the case; for if that noted institution were once fully discovered, we fear it would put an end to the principal incentive to an exploration of our mountains for gold.

A CHINESE-MEXICAN MAN.—There was great excitement during the forepart of the week over the not uncommon event of the birth of an infant, (just as if such things were not happening every day, and have been since the recollection of the oldest inhabitant.) What renders the advent of the infant stranger here so conspicuously chronicled, however, worthy of particular notice, is the fact of its being a first edition, for this place, of the new American citizen, whom Sumner and his followers have, at such vast expense, endeavored to introduce. A young Celestial may excite some curiosity now; but after awhile we will become more used to the animal.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday morning of this week the iron door over the cellar in front of Bilger's tin-shop was opened for some purpose, and Charles Lovel in walking along the sidewalk, not noticing it, accidentally fell through the door way, his chin and neck catching on the door. By some means, a gash was cut in his throat, from which he came near bleeding to death. Dr. Ganung was called, and succeeded in stopping the flow of blood. Such traps are dangerous, and should be set with something like precaution in a vicinity so frequented by the public.

LOAD OF HAY UPSET.—Mr. Booth, one of the proprietors of the Livery stable at Ashland, was hauling hay day before yesterday and, on going down the hill at Rockyfellow's old diggings, found that the break would not work and the load was precipitated over the grade—damaging the wagon somewhat. In trying to rescue his son, who was on the load at the time, Mr. Booth sprained his ankle badly.
