

Telegraphic.

CARLSRUHE, Aug. 6-6:15 p. m.—Forward movement, right of Prussians from Treves and Saar Louis commenced yesterday. Prussians captured Siercke, and attacked Thionville in overwhelming numbers. After some resistance, French threw away their arms and took to flight; at same time army commanded by Crown Prince moved in direction of Biche—advanced guard of French making slight resistance. To-day there was general advancing of the whole army. upwards of 2,000 prisoners have been forwarded to Frankfurt. Position of main body French army at present unknown. Great battle began yesterday, but was interrupted by darkness; it was resumed early this morning and continued until 7 p. m. Victory declared for French.

PARIS, 6th.—Information has been received that heavy fighting has been going on since morning at several points along frontier.

LONDON, 7.—Information received says victory of Crown Prince was complete. Prussians advanced to Hagenu and captured the place.

MEZ, 7.—Dispatches from Emperor say McMahon has lost a battle, and my communication with him is cut off. Battle lasted all day.

PARIS, 7.—Paris is declared in a state of siege. LATER.—The Prussians are over the frontier and advancing on Paris. Great battle is imminent.

BERLIN, 7.—Dispatches from Mayence 6th, 10 p. m., say the French have been turned back on their whole line, and commenced to retreat toward the interior of France. Saarbrucken has been retaken by first Prussian army corps. Prince Royal reports we have defeated McMahon, who was heavily reinforced. Have taken two eagles, six mitrailleurs, thirty cannon, and four thousand prisoners. Our loss is heavy.

PARIS, 7.—McMahon fallen back to St. Avone. Frossard has retreated a short distance. Emperor has issued a proclamation saying: "The opening of the war is unfavorable to France; let us hasten to repair reverses; let there be but one party, and that for France." A special train left for the front to bring back Prince Imperial. The defence of Paris is assured.

LONDON, 7.—A Herald's dispatch says entire number of prisoners taken by Prussians is 8,000.

MEZ, 7.—Thionville is evacuated, and the Prussians have crossed the Rhine from South Baden.

It is contended that trout fishing is not a cruel sport; that the wriggling of the fish on dry land is not indicative of agony, but of ecstasy. It has been taken from the water, where there is but little oxygen, into the air, where there is a good deal of it, and feels just as a person does when he takes laughing gas, and suffers no more pain. Perhaps!

One of the biggest reptile stories yet, is that of an alligator near Midway, S. C., which a planter has used in harness to do his plowing. The animal weighs 350 pounds and is said to be perfectly docile and thoroughly "broken in" to his work. This allegation is somewhat astonishing, to say the least.

The plaintiffs in the steamer City of Boston suit acknowledge the derangement of the machinery, but deny the overloading. This admission removes much chance of a verdict for large damages.

The Spectator, alluding to the wish of Mr. Dickens to be buried in Rochester cathedral, says: "No man's right of property in his body can well be deemed to last beyond the moment at which he parts with it."

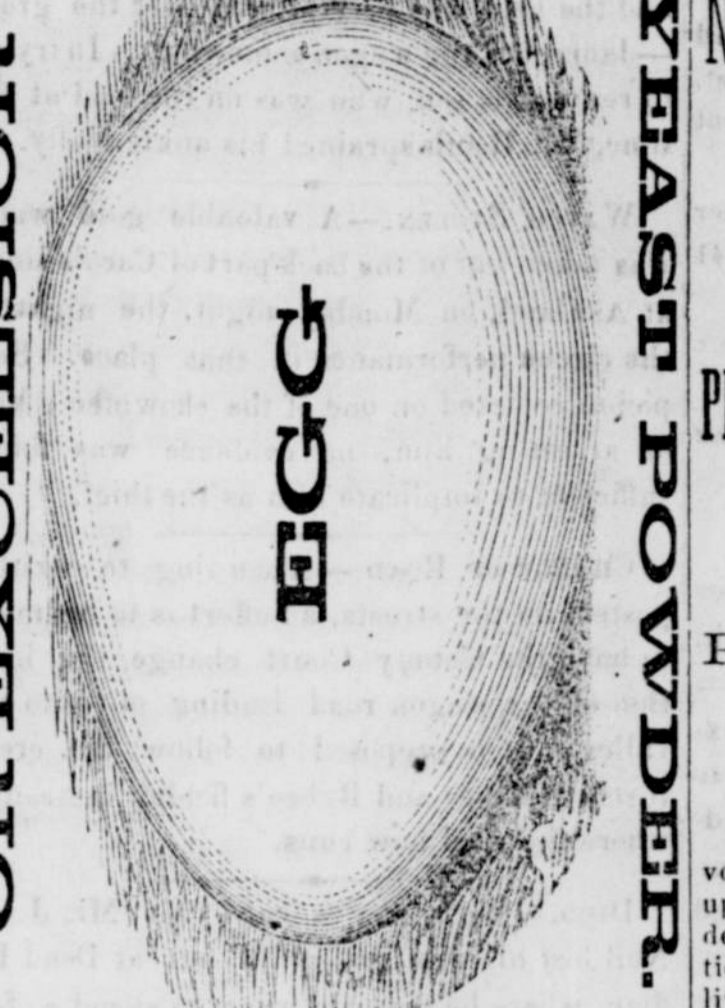
