

**Who is Eugenie's Father?**

A correspondent of the *Tribune* says: The *Journal Officiel*, the other day, contained the announcement that the Court would go into mourning for eight days, beginning with Sunday, July 3, for Jerome Bonaparte-Patterson, who died recently at Baltimore. 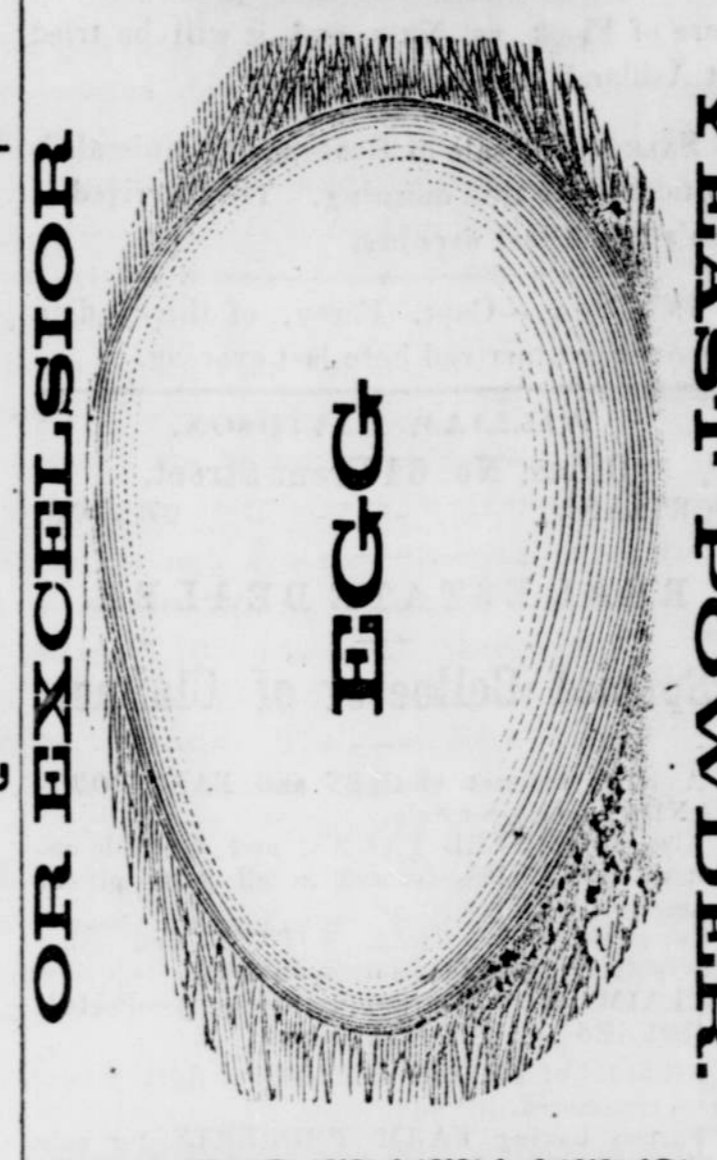
