Important Telegraphic News.

The following telegrams, exclusive to the NEWS, were received last Saturday, too late for insertion in that issue. We give them to our readers as the most reliable news yet received from the war:

PARIS, Aug. 20.—The Empress, becoming dissatisfied with the extravagant conduct of the war, has telegraphed for Ben Holladay to come to Paris and run the machine "with a cold nose."

WORTH, 20.—Michael Reese, the eminent San Francisco millionaire, visited the camp at this place to-day, by invitation of Crown Prince. He expressed himself delighted with the appearance of the troops and presented them with \$40,000 worth of gingerbread.

PARIS, 20.—Frank Pixley has presented his mule to the Emperor for a battle charger, with the stipulation that no Chinese shall be allowed to serve in the French Army.

Rochefort's *Lanterne* is to be revived under editorial management of Dr. A. A. Ames. The Doctor hails from Portland, and brings high testimonials from James O'Meara and other French citizens of Oregon.

The *Monteur* denies that any soldier from Goose Lake voted on the Plebiscite.

Victor Hugo is appointed Judge Advocate on the staff of Changarnier. He carries the musket used by old John Brown at Harper's Ferry.

BERLIN, 20.—The King has given a command to General Butler. His pay will be six thousand dollars a year, and half the spoons.

General Moltke has ordered (through Caro Brothers,) forty thousand blankets from the Ashland Woolen Works, for the Prussians.

Bismarck has been given leave of absence for two weeks, to recruit his health. He will visit Jacksonville and anticipate pleasure in playing whist at the "New State."

It is denied that the French army have got their lives insured in the Pacific Life Ins. Co of Sacramento.

SAN FRANCISCO, 20.—It is currently believed that Isaac Sachs, of your city, has the ticket that will draw the grand prize in the Mercantile Library Lottery.

The Tax Payers' Convention adjourned to-day, after making the following nominations; for Governor in 1871, Thomas Mooney; for Lieutenant Governor, Brian Borhu.

It is reported that the Central Pacific Co. have effected a compromise with Brannan by paying him ten thousand gallons of brandy cocktails.

VICTORIA, 20th.—Baron DeBussche won't accept the position of Paymaster in the Prussian army. He says he has a better thing.

WOMANLY MODESTY.—Man loves the mysterious. A cloudless sky, the full-blown rose, leaves him unmoved, but the violet which hides its blushing beauties behind the bush, and the moon when she emerges from behind a cloud, are to him sources of inspiration and pleasure.
