How the Prussian Army is Recruited.

The Berlin correspondent of the London Telegraph says:

After the first burst of passionate protest against the aggression of France had subsided, the inhabitants of the Capital returned to their avocations, stripped the Linden of its bunting, and made up their minds to the war as a necessary evil. Round the barracks and military storehouse large crowds were collected from early morning till late at night ; but these were chiefly composed of military drafts, assembled at short intervals for con. by the version into full-fledged soldiers, and exhibiting, previous to their being swallowed up by the ever-yawning gateways, a strange variety of costume. From the ragged blouse and greasy cap to the fashionable frock-coat and carefully brushed "cylinder" there was but a step; gentlemen and proletaries were side by side, waiting for their turn to assume the blue tunic and helmet; and every ten of BLANKETS, CASSIMERES, TWEEDS, plain minutes or so a motley throng of some five TWILLED and CHECK FFANNELS, &C. &C. or six hundred civilians, told off from every of the best quality and at class of society, was marched in under the care of a few Sergeants at one gate, to emerge half an hour later from another, a smart looking, completely equipped body of soldiers. In that half hour all social distinctions had vanished from among them, not to be revived till the end of the war. They went in as doctors, cabmen, lawyers, shop-walkers, clerks, waiters, rentiers and artisans; they came out Prussian cavalry, artillery and infantry, armed at all points, and ready to march against their country's foe. My stay in Berlin lasted exactly thirty-six hours, and the windows of my room overlooked one of these transformation scenes in the Charlotte-Strasse.
