### Religious Notice.

**A HUGE TROUT.**—A feat that would have excited the mortal envy of Mr. Isaac Walton in the palmiest days of his successful angling, was performed by Hon. J. B. White, the champion fisherman of Rogue River Valley, one day last week, near his place at Rock Point. A large, speckled trout, weighing 12 lbs. and 9 oz., and measuring 32 inches in length, was successfully and scientifically landed, high and dry, on terra firma, much to the chagrin, no doubt, of a rival angler in that vicinity. **INFORMATION FOR THE SENTINEL.**—We are informed by one of the County Commissioners that it is the intention of the Board to have the County patients taken care of by special arrangement, as they appear and are pronounced fit subjects for public charge. In this way, invalids can have something to say with regard to the physician under whose care they would prefer to be, and it is contended that economy sanctions this plan, as the additional expense, outside the Hospital, often amounts to as much as the contract price for the County doctoring. When experience proves the contrary, we have no doubt different arrangements will be made.

**A TEAMSTER'S COLLISION.**—As Mr. Louis Hayes was coming down one of the steep grades beyond the Law Divide on the Crescent City road last week, a six horse team, that was just behind him, was precipitated, on account of the break giving way, upon his own team—the horses landing clear upon top of the wagon, doing great damage to the animals attached to each wagon. All in a heap, both teams were crowded down the hill for some distance; the drivers being unable to do anything but let them slide. Two or three of the horses are, perhaps, permanently disabled.

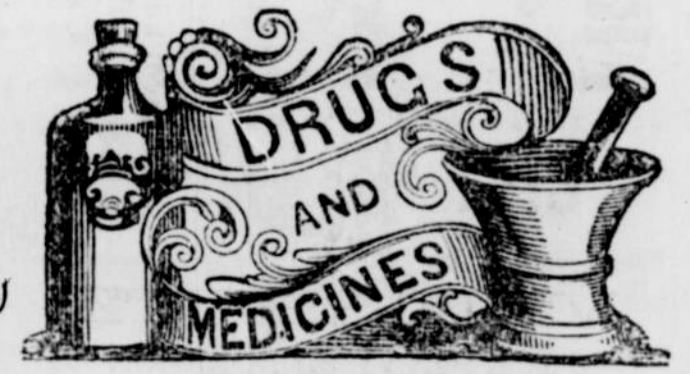
