## LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

**RICH QUARTZ.**—Having heard so much said about the richness of some of the quartz now being taken out by Sam Bowden from his ledge on Timber gulch, we concluded to make a visit to the seat of operations and examine the matter for ourselves. Five hands are at work taking out quartz, while perhaps an equal number are engaged hauling the same and running the Mill. The main shaft is down a little over fifty feet at which depth the ground tunnel is being run along the lead and all the quartz from there up is windlassed out for crushing. Much of the quartz is surprisingly rich. It looks as if a person could make a hundred dollars a day or more with a hand mortar, so thickly is some of it bespangled with gold. Some of the hands estimate that that is being crushed in the Mill at forty dollars a ton. Occasionally pockets are found which contain nearly pure gold. Out of one such deposit six ounces and seven dollars were obtained one day last week, and similar streaks, though not quite so extensive, were found this week. This is in the lower lead; the upper one didn't pay. Another clean up will be had in a few days, when we expect to hear of gratifying results.

**BYBEE'S BARN BURNED.**—On Friday night of last week, after the News had been struck off, a cry of fire was raised just a little before midnight. It proved to be the barn of Wm. Bybee, about one mile north of town. Many persons ran out to it, but, of course, could do nothing towards staying its ravages. Three valuable horses and about 80 tons of hay were consumed with the barn. The fire was evidently the work of an incendiary, and Tom Brown was arrested by Marshal Seaman on suspicion by the time the fire was fully under way. He was seen coming from that direction as the first blaze was discovered, and his actions led to the suspicion that induced his arrest. Mr. Bybee's loss is put down at \$3,500. Brown was bound over.

When the matter was pressed on John's consideration he showed fight, and the Jailor then resorted to a chair post which had the effect of thoroughly reconstructing John.

**ANOTHER ROBBERY.**—This place is about to rival Portland in the number of its thefts and robberies. One night this week an individual was handling a twenty rather carelessly in one of the saloons, when it dropped out of his hand and rolled close to another chap who was standing near the bar. The latter nabbed the twenty and made off with it, but was soon arrested and made to fork over and go to jail.

**STORE ROBBERED.**—The store of G. Karewski, on the corner of California and Oregon Streets, known as the Haine's brick, was entered through an aperture made in the wall near the ceiling, on Friday night a week ago, and the sum of \$318 abstracted from the drawer. It is supposed to have been the work of Chinamen and one or two have been arrested, but no part of the money has been recovered.

**LOST.**—On the Valley road, between Wm. Chamber's and Jacksonville, a fine merchaum pipe. The pipe is nicely colored, and had a fine silver tube on the stem end. The finder will be liberally rewarded by leaving the same at this office.

**BAILEY,** charged with an assault with a deadly weapon, was bound over in the sum of \$1,000 by Justice Wade, to await the action of the Grand Jury.

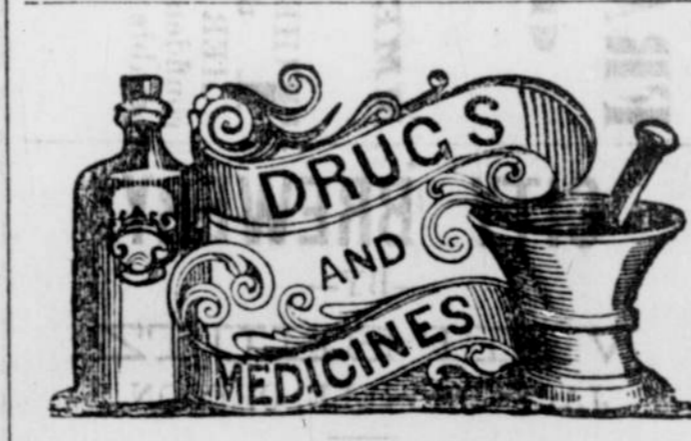
