AT HALF BATE IN A BOX.

Nebraska Man's Solution of the Problem of Cheap Railroad Travel.

The Burlington operates a line to Sheridan, Wy., at which point the Adams Express company has an office. About two weeks ago a man called upon Mr. Smith, depot agent for the Adams quired the cost of shipping a box, weighing about 250 pounds, to Sheridan. He was informed that it would be about \$10.

A few minutes before train time an express wagon brought the box to the depot. It was unloaded, weighed, mediately placed on board the express car, preparatory to taking a 750 mile journey.

The box was abcut 6 feet long and 3 fect wide and weighed 273 pounds. The express charges were \$12.15 and were paid by a man whose identity the express company is now attempting to establish. The train duly arrived in Sheridan and the box, among other goods, was unloaded from the express car and stored in the depot and the doors locked.

In about half an hour Agent Wood was informed that the express office door was ajar, and the belief was voiced that burglars were at work robbing the place. The agent at once secured the assistance of several men, and after arming themselves they entered the express office. Nothing was found disturbed except the Omaha box. It was empty. The lid had been forced from the box, and the contents were gone When the box was critically examined, it was found that no instrument had been used from the outside to loosen the cover.

Upon the inside at one end was plainly to be seen the print of a man's feet. The size of the box, the weight and the footprints were sufficient to convince the agent it had certainly contained a human being, and that upon his arrival at the end of the journey he simply opened the box, walked over to the door. unbolted it and disappeared.

HE PERSPIRED BLOOD.

Edward Dunn Was One of the Very Few Suffers From Petechial Hemorrhage.

Edward Dunn, 32 years old, employed in a printing establishment at 26 Vandewater street, and apparently perfectly healthy, went to the Chambers Street hospital the other day, blood exuding from the pores of the skin of his arm and face. He said he must have lost much blood, but wasn't weakened by it.

Dr. Taylor was puzzled over the phenomenon and said he hardly knew how to treat it. There was evidently no artery severed, as the blood did not spurt out violently, as it would have done in that case. While the doctor was trying to decide what he could do for Dunn, the curious flow stopped of itself. It had lasted about an hour. Dunn returned to work.


