that the people propose soon to continue the protective record.

THERE is a glowing satisfaction in the fact that Republicans compose a party that has in no way been connected with disloyalty or anarchy. Not a man, who is a Republican has uttered a disloyal sentiment, thrown a bomb, or threatened fire and blood devastation for the majority. They are unlike some other members of parties, who, right or wrong must have their way. No Republican has to confront a history of his party that is scarred with disunion or menacing threats of destruction of property and lives, but a more glorious and fruitful history is behind as well as before it, that of true loyalty and a thrill of sympathy for the protection of Americans and American industries.

WILL STAND BY APPELATE.

IT is now very clear to all that Capt. O. C. Applegate, the candidate for the republican nomination for Secretary of State, will have the heart and hand of the Southern Oregon delegation. Extensive inquiry has led to the conclusion that he is as well liked outside of the four counties of the First Judicial District, where everybody is his friend, as he is at home. No man was ever more deserving of his popularity. Though qualified to fill any executive office, he has only a very moderate estimate of his own worth and importance. The average politician forms a high opinion of his own consequence before either measuring or weighing it, and there are times when his arrogance and presumption in office are dreadfully tiring. But Capt. Applegate, as everybody knows, is always inclined to assume much less than his due, while contending more than is the due of others. Twenty years ago this modesty shone conspicuously before the delegation of Southern Oregon at the republican convention that honored him with an offer of the nomination for Secretary of State. "I'm too young," he replied, "and must request to withdraw in favor of the older candidate." The delegates of Southern Oregon will certainly stand up for Applegate in the convention, and his nomination and election is only a question of time.—Klamath Star.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN MASSACHUSETTS.

THE first report of the Free Public Library Commission of Massachusetts has been issued, handsomely illustrated with views of the chief library buildings in the state. Of the 351 towns and cities in Massachusetts but 163 are without free public libraries, and these places are for the most part small and dwindling towns, which contain but one-seventeenth of the State's population. In 175 cases the libraries are directly under municipal control. Two and a half million volumes are at the service of the public in the State's free libraries, and on an average each volume is taken out twice in the year. Although municipalities have in many cases established these libraries, they usually owe their existence to the generosity of sons of Massachusetts, who, however, far from their native state they might win fame or fortune, have faithfully cherished the memory of home. Benjamin Franklin, George Peabody and William Cullen Bryant are enrolled upon this list of benefactors, whose gifts amount in the aggregate to five and a half million dollars. As a rule, the buildings erected in this way are architecturally rich and beautiful. Several of them contain patriotic memorials of the soldiers who fell in the civil war. For not a few of the librarian's services are gratuitous. Boston's library, of course, leads all the rest in the extent of its treasures. On October 1, 1890, it contained 334,083 volumes. The annual appropriation by the city for its support is \$120,000, and its staff numbers 142 persons. On Copley Square a new structure is rising for its accommodation, which will cost two and a half millions. Within its courts will be open air corridors, with chairs for five hundred readers in the warmer months of the year. In its present cramped quarters the library is not as useful in proportion to its size as the much smaller one at Worcester. Here the shelves are particularly rich in the departments of chemistry, physics, mechanics, and the fine and industrial arts. The working people and artists employed in the city's numerous manufacturing plants make constant and increasing use of the library. The aim is to establish pleasant personal relations between the frequenters of the library and its officers. Anybody having a question to ask, the answer to which may be found in a book, is cordially welcomed, assisted and encouraged to come again. In Worcester, as in many other cities and towns of Massachusetts, the public library is linked to the public school system. Rooms are set apart where teachers may bring their classes and use as many works of reference as they please. Any deficiency which comes to light

through the search of teacher or student receives attention at once. In Cambridge, a city of 90,000 inhabitants, the public library has five delivery stations where books are received and given out three times a week. Every teacher in the high school, and in the higher grades of the grammar schools, is given ten cards for the use of pupils. By a weekly delivery to each school of books, as the teachers direct, a large amount of the best reading is put into the hands of the children.

ACROSS the border of Massachusetts, in the neighboring state of Rhode Island, the Providence Public Library makes itself useful in a very original way. In the Providence Journal every Monday morning, Mr. W. E. Foster, the librarian, seizes upon the topic of chief current interest and tells what books in the library bear upon it, with page references when necessary, and the catalogue numbers. From day to day he supplements this on the library bulletin board by other references to the most interesting news items of the press. In this way he brings out the value of his books just at the time it can be best appreciated. Library management in our country is now a recognized profession with a college at Albany, N. Y., under the direction of Mr. Melvil Dewey, librarian to the state. In the Library Journal of New York, the profession has its organ, edited by Mr. Paul Leicester Ford, the well known historian.—Herold.

THE BENEFITS OF WAR.

IN these days of peace platitudes talked by monarchs at the head of armed millions, it is a graceful novelty to have a warrior come forth as a frank defender of carnage and essayist on "The Benefits of War." Rear-Admiral S. B. Luce, of the United States Navy, is the gentleman and officer who has so soldierly a courage of his convictions, and his views are expressed in the current issue of the North American Review. It would be unkind to guess that he takes so bold a stand in print because he sees no chance of exhibiting his heroism on the decks of his flagship; and so the guess will not be hazarded. But, however that may be, he writes ably and earnestly in defence of the proposition that "War is one of the great agencies by which human progress is effected." His style is authoritative and axiomatic rather than argumentative and persuasive. "War is the malady of nations," he says. "The disease is terrible while it lasts, but purifying in its effects. It tries a nation and chastens it, as sickness or adversity tries and chastens the individual. There is a wisdom that comes only of suffering, whether to the family or to the aggregation of families—the nation. Man is perfected through suffering. What is true of the average individual is true of the mass of individuals—the people."

HE follows the history of the world, searching for instances to bear out his contention; and quite naturally finds the path of progress red with shambles of war. Thus the disciplined troops of Greece made Greek learning and civilization dominant, while the trained legions of Rome in turn gained the pre-eminence of the Empire of Augustus. He quotes from a profound biblical scholar to show that the Roman legions did much to spread the teachings of the Man of Peace. The quotation is this: "The world, before it was ready to accept Hellenism and Christianity, had to be prepared and made smooth for centuries beforehand. A great humanizing force had to be created—a force powerful enough to beat down the obstacles which local patriotism offered to the idealistic propaganda of Greece and Judea. Rome fulfilled this extraordinary function. Rome, by prodigies of civic virtue, created the force of the world, and this force served to propagate the work of Greece and the work of Judea—that is to say, civilization."

THE same idea is carried by the author into later British history; and the position solemnly contended for that "Christianity * * * has often had to work its own way through the instrumentality of the sword." This is, indeed, one of the main "benefits of war" for which he contends. The Peace Society would probably send him a copy of Lowell, with the page turned down at the lines

"For war, I call it murder— 'There you've it plain and dat; I don't want to go no farther Than my Testament for that."

But the Rear-Admiral might be tempted to idly turn the pages of his Lowell until he came to this stanza, written when the war against slavery was pending:

God give us power, not such as lulls to sleep, But sword on thigh and bow with purpose knit And let our ship of state to harbor sweep. Her ports all up, see battle banners lit, And her hoisted thunderbolts gathering for their leap.

Then he would retort that while Lowell condemned the war against Mexico, which he thought to be unjustifiable, he was eager for the war that was

to free the slaves. The truth is that wrong war is wrong, and right war is right. War in the abstract is wrong; but it is a lesser wrong than that men should be enslaved or that missionaries of the Cross should be wantonly butchered in China. In a law governed city, it is wrong to strike a man; but if a man has broken into your house at midnight and is brutally kidnapping your little girl, it would be a wrong not to strike him. Thus, on a larger scale, it is cheap to talk of the disarmament of Europe; but until the Muscovite hordes of Russia are tamed, the disarmament of western Europe would be an invitation to rapine, plunder and slaughter. Of course, no one argues in our day for the position of the mad man in Tennyson's Maud, who sneers at Peace sitting under her olive, and slurring the days gone by. When the poor are howling and hustled together, each sex, like swine, When only the lobster lives, and when only not all men lie.

And rushes to the conclusion: "Better war, of warily land and by sea; War with a thousand battles and shaking a thousand throats."

WAR for war's sake has passed the range of the possible, unless the uneasy Czar of the Russias still lingers about the borderland, but war will not cease to be the last court of appeal against tyranny and injustice until the principles of the Man of Peace predominate throughout the world.

THE LOYAL GRAND ARMY

THE following resolutions were at a late meeting of Lafayette Post unanimously adopted, on the motion of Comrade George P. Edgar, Department Commander Cleary and Commander-in-Chief Adams have both approved them. It is thought wise to ask the Commanders of the Posts of this State and other G. A. R. officials throughout the Union to have them made known through the medium of the press in their respective localities.

WHEREAS, From 1861 to 1865 more than a million of loyal sons of the Republic left their home and assumed the risks incident to war and camp life and of battle on land and sea that this nation might live and that the supremacy of the Stars and Stripes might be maintained against the enemies of the Union and of order; and

WHEREAS, That supreme effort for life, ever ready to die for loyalty and the flag, cost 400,000 loyal lives, made 300,000 Union soldiers and sailors cripples for life and left more than a million devoted mothers, widows, sisters and orphans to mourn for their loved ones who did not return; and

WHEREAS, After all this sacrifice, it is constantly appearing in many sections of the land that there is a spirit of disregard for law and its peaceful modes of administration on the part of a large number of those who are not in sympathy with our institutions and who are constantly indicating their ignorance of the true meaning of "liberty of speech" and assume that "freedom" means to do just as each one pleases, not seeming to understand that they themselves are protected by the laws they would destroy; and

WHEREAS, We, the members of a post of loyal soldiers and sailors, representing nearly 600 comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, now over 450,000 strong, and also more than half a million of those who are eligible to become members of it, having passed through the furnace of war, and been tried by fire to defend and preserve the integrity of the country, feel that it is incumbent upon us, at this time, to declare our continued love for and devotion to the Union of the United States of America and its Constitution, and to insist that all within our borders, as well as ourselves, shall obey the laws of the land, municipal, state and national, and in a spirit of loyalty protect the flag of our country, as the emblem of liberty, equal rights and national unity; and

WHEREAS, In view of the fact that we are no less citizens than we were thirty years ago, when we, as young men, declared in a practical way for the supremacy of law and the national flag, we now resolve, That it is in our opinion the duty of all the authorities of the land, municipal, state and national, to enforce obedience to law at whatever cost; that respect for law is the steady balance of the American citizen, and the lawless must be forced into silence and order.

Resolved, That we feel justified in pledging to the officers of the law throughout the land the hearty sympathy and co-operation of all members of the Grand Army of the Republic in every effort to put down unlawful assemblages and to quell any spirit of disloyalty or resistance to the orderly and faithful administration of the law.

Resolved, That it is the judgment of this Post that no other flag than "Old Glory" should float from any of our public buildings or be carried in processions, except on occasions when foreign officials are the guests of the nation, state or municipality, and the proper legislation should be had to this end.
