THE GOVERNMENT WORK.

Another derrick has been erected at the quarry so the work of handling rock can be done much faster than when only one derrick was used. A scow load of rock weighing about 300 tons has been taken to the jetty each day for several weeks, and now with increased facilities the contractors expect the work to go on much more rapidly.

They intend soon to commence putting in brush mattresses on which to dump the rock—something that has not been done before. Some of the men who worked at building the scows will now be employed at the mouth of the river and others will work at the quarry.

About 1000 people were at the station at Eugene Sunday morning to see W. J. Bryan. He appeared on the platform but did not speak. According to the Oregonian he addressed 5000 people at Gladstone Park, 10,000 at Lebanon, and 20,000 at Portland and many others at the small towns along the railroad.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Lane county teachers' institute will meet in Villard Hall July 28th, and continue in session for two weeks. This is the annual meeting which all teachers are required to attend. Superintendent Hunt announces that he will follow the law strictly in this matter. The institute will be divided into two grades; one for those who have never taught or who hold second and third grade certificates and the other for those holding first grade certificates, state certificates or diplomas. The tuition will be free.

Prof. Ackerman, Prof. Friedel, and Miss Chase are among the instructors. Superintendent Hunt will have general charge of the institute. Lectures will be given by Pres. Campbell, State Supt. Irwin and others.

The institute will continue in session till the August examination.

The following circular has been received by School Supt. Hunt:

SALEM, Ore., June 23, '97. County Supt. Hunt:—In a few days I will send you a supply of the new edition of the Oregon school laws. There will not be sufficient copies to distribute them as fully as might be desired, but it is my purpose that the county superintendent shall supply each district in his county with one copy of the law, the same to be placed in the hands of the district clerk, that the same be present at the time of any board meeting.

I trust the school boards will be careful of the copy furnished them, as they are not private property and do not belong to any individual, but are the property of the school board.

School districts having no copy of the law should apply to the county superintendent at once.

HOUSEHOLD DEPARTMENT

DESSERTS.

Bread pudding: Use only nice light bread; soak bread in milk and wash fine. To 1 quart of bread and milk add three eggs beaten separately, 1 cup sugar (scant), 1 heaping tablespoon butter and a handful of raisins if liked. Bake and serve hot with butter. For a nice variation omit sugar and serve with sauce given for rice pudding No. 2.

Cottage pudding: 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup milk, 2 cups flour, 2 heaping teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon butter; bake and serve with sauce. Sauce: 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup butter stirred to a cream; stir in 1 heaping tablespoon flour; stir while pouring on 1 pint boiling water; season with nutmeg.

Corn starch pudding: Take 1 cup of milk out of 1 quart, put the remainder in a spider on the stove, mix 1/2 cup of corn starch with a little milk, stir into the boiling milk, then stir in 4 eggs slightly beaten with a little milk, salt to taste and serve with sweetened cream flavored with vanilla. This pudding can be made in a few minutes.

NOODLES. (GERMAN)

Prepare some curd as for cottage cheese, it should be well scalded and drained very dry, rub and work this smooth with the hand, salt to taste; to 3 cups of curd add 2 eggs slightly beaten, mix well, add a little flour enough to enable you to handle the mixture—after a little experience you will be able to get it just right—form into rolls the size of your finger and fry in plenty of hot butter, serve with honey or sugar syrup. These are a very good substitute for bread.

CIRCUIT COURT AT ROSEBURG.

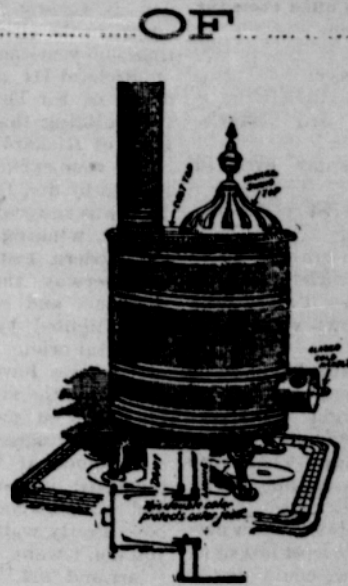
