INSTITUTE AT GARDINER.

On Monday morning, Aug. 16th the institute work began. The teachers in town desired to go to work as they wished to get all out of the institute possible.

Prof. J. H. Akerman of Portland had charge of the work of the day. That it was a profitable day goes without saying. His work for the day was in the forenoon, an arduous lecture in language work. In the afternoon, he took up as a study in U. S. history the period of confederation, ordinance of 1787, and the cause of the adoption of our constitution and a study of its chief provisions. As no one ever tires under Mr. Akerman's instructions, I. e., no student, the whole afternoon session was devoted to this work.

In the evening the institute was formally opened by music, addresses of welcome and responses followed by a lecture by Dr. Kuykendall.

Tuesday morning the work of the institute was taken up by Prof. Barzee. He chose to present the subject of Alcohol and its effects upon the human system. His work was clear, pointed and forcible.

After recess the professor took up mental arithmetic upon which he gave a good talk and solved some knotty problems and unfolded the simple principles involved. He made the point that there are no difficult problems. The difficulty is in the mind of the student. We don't read well is the trouble. To read is to interpret. When the problem is read it is solved.

An exercise by Prof. Akerman in History, one by Prof. Barzee, followed by an address by Scott Morris made up the work of the afternoon.

The evening session consisted of music, recitations, and a lecture by Mr. Cushman one of Roseburg's attorneys.

Wednesday was spent in regular institute work. Prof. R. B. Dilworth of Roseburg participating. The day's session closed with an experience meeting or "Teachers' Love Feast" and the benediction by Rev. Rounds. In the evening Prof. Dilworth gave a lecture on "The Evolution of the Teacher." This in keeping with the other lectures of the week, was a masterpiece. Some fine music and Prof. Barzee's poem, "The White City by the Sea," read by Eva Cornwall closed the institute course.

NOTES.

Mr. Stalker of U. of O. was present to enlist members in university extension.

At the examination preceding the institute a class of 11 appeared. Six were granted certificates.

Mrs. Short, of Wilbur, Ore., rendered several fine solos at the evening sessions.

Miss Maud Cornwall and others rendered some fine instrumental music during the week.

A choir of many voices rendered choice music at every evening session.

The town of Gardiner and the citizens of the surrounding country covered themselves with glory, doing everything they could think of to make the institute a success. Nothing was omitted from a box of choice apples to the free use of a steamboat. Everybody turned out on Thursday to the beach picnic given in honor of the teachers.

It was unanimously agreed that this was an unusually good institute and that the people of Gardiner are the best and most appreciative people to meet with on such an occasion.

That we may again go to Gardiner was the avowed sentiment of every teacher and visitor.

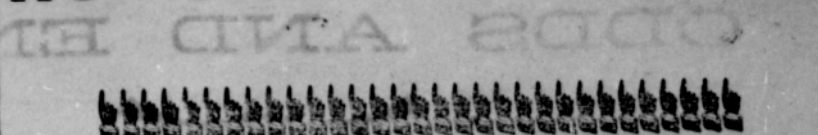

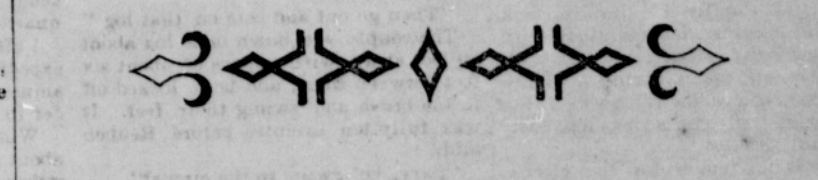
