A FATAL ACCIDENT.

A Powder Man Killed While Preparing a Blast. Fell a Distance of 80 ft.

Blast Explodes Prematurely in the Rock Quarry at Point Terrace

Word was brought to Florence yesterday afternoon that a man named Peter Anderson was instantly killed in the quarry at Point Terrace yesterday about 11 a. m. He was employed as powderman in being part of his work to attend to the blasting.

Word was immediately sent to Florence—the messenger meeting the Lillian on her way up the river. The Lillian turned back after Justice Wilson but he did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest.

THE UNFORTUNATE MAN had been on the river but a few months. He came here about June 1st and has worked in the quarry for Wakefield & Jacobson since that time. He was about 30 years old.

THAT INJUNCTION SUIT. George H. Williams of Portland and L. Bilyeu of Eugene have been retained as Attorneys.

Register: A gentleman, who is a prominent leader in opposing the proposed location of Lane county's court house, which is now pending under order of commissioner's court, informed the Register this morning that an injunction suit will be filed in a few days to prevent if possible any further proceedings in the matter.

The committee appointed at the public meeting a few weeks ago to solicit funds with which to carry on suit has secured sufficient funds to at least carry the case through the lower courts, and if need be enough may be secured to carry it to the higher courts.

COURT HOUSE HISTORY. Last week the Guard and Register each published a history of the court house used by Lane county at the present time.

The building has been in use 42 years being erected in 1855 by M. H. Harlow and A. W. Hammit for the sum of \$8,500. The site was obtained from Eugene F. Skinner, after whom the town was named, and Charnel Milligan.

SEASONABLE HINTS. A correspondent sends us the following which may be of assistance to some of our readers:

As fruit is plenty this year and you wish to make jams, butter, and preserve and haven't an asbestos mat just spread about 1/2 inch of ashes on the stove and set your pan on them and your fruit will not scorch.

When you wish to open a Mason jar don't break the top off as I have seen some people do, but simply take a thin bladed table knife, insert it under the rubber and next the jar and draw carefully around not cutting the rubber; now you may unscrew your cover very easy.

THE MINERS' STRIKE. At Hazleton, Penn., on the 11th inst. 21 men were killed and about 40 wounded in trouble between a company of deputy sheriffs armed to the teeth and about 150 strikers whose arms are said to have consisted of a few penknives.

Warrants were issued for the arrest of the sheriff and 102 deputies but up to a late hour that night they had not been served. Great excitement prevails. 25,000 soldiers camped in the town that night.

Many of the prominent citizens of the town have drawn up a formal protest, not only against the action of the sheriff but against the calling out of the militia which they declare was unnecessary.

Despatches from Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 11th announce that the strike which began July 4th is settled so far western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and West Virginia are concerned by the action of the interstate miners convention after a four days session. The proposition of the Pittsburg operators was accepted by a vote of 495 to 317.
