A TELEPHONE LINE.

There is talk of a telephone line here soon from Portland to Roseburg. An office no doubt will be established here. Rumor says James A. Sterling will be manager. There are two other lines promised to act as feeders, one from Boswell Springs and one from Elkton, and probably another from Hudson. It is said one will run from Empire to Gardiner, and if the people of Florence will bestir themselves it may extend to that place. The editor of the West should talk it up. If these lines are built one can talk to Spokane on the north and Los Angeles on the south, and all the cities along the coast; to the light houses and life saving stations. Hope to see it; also more railroads north and south and down the coast.

NEW POSTAL DISTRICT.

Oregonian: A new postal district has just been established, consisting of the states of Oregon and Washington. The change goes into effect November 1st. Henceforth, Oregon and Washington have been a part of the Pacific coast district, including California and other coast states, and the postal inspectors who covered this state, consisting of H. P. Thrall, W. A. Robinson, J. C. F. Gordon, and occasionally Charles Flint, had their headquarters in San Francisco. These inspectors investigate violations of the postal laws, check up accounts of postmasters, and exercise a careful supervision as to certain matters. Mr. Robinson, who is oldest in the service, has been coming here for the past 18 years. Three new inspectors for the new district will be taken from the civil service list. The headquarters for the new district will be at Spokane, where the chief inspector's office will be located. Our former inspectors will hereafter confine their efforts to California, Nevada, etc.

OBITUARY.

Died in Florence, Oregon on Tuesday, Nov. 2nd, 1897, Daniel Hill, aged 19 years, 2 months and 12 days.

Daniel Hill, the son of J. B. Hill, was born in Butte county, California in 1878. When he was three years old his mother died. In 1884 his father and family moved to Oregon settling near Hale in this county where they resided for some time, then about two years ago moved to Florence.

Daniel or Dannie, as he was called, had not been in good health for a month or so but kept at work till about two weeks ago. He was able to walk around till Saturday evening when he took to bed to rise no more. He grew worse rapidly till his death which occurred about 7 o'clock Tuesday evening.

The funeral services were held next day, an address being delivered by Rev. I. G. Knotts and the remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows' cemetery at Glenada.

Daniel was an honest, industrious young man liked by his associates and respected by those who knew him. His death is a great loss to the family, who have the sympathy of all in their affliction.

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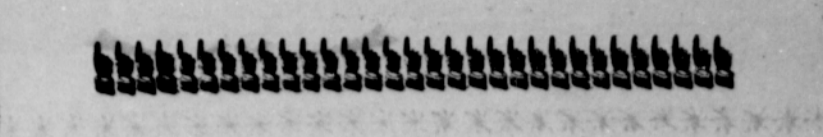
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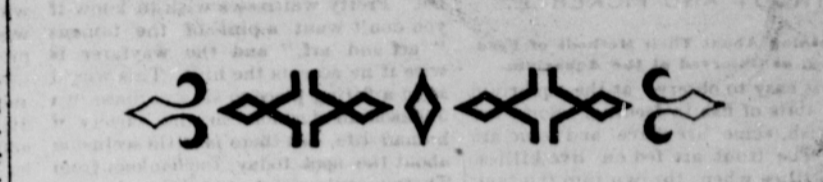
