TONGUE RENOMINATED.

Has no Opposition in the Convention.

The convention which met at Eugene the 11th, to nominate a candidate for congressman from the first congressional district of Oregon was called to order by R. J. Hendricks chairman of the congressional committee.

Dr. T. W. Harris of Lane county was elected chairman and J. R. Whitney of Linn county secretary.

The report of the committee on credentials showed 49 proxies in a convention of 145. The following resolutions were adopted:

1st: It affirmed the national republican platform adopted at St. Louis.

2nd: We declare our confidence in the present administration at Washington and especially in the wisdom of President McKinley in dealing with the Cuban and other questions.

3rd: Also our congressional and other improvements.

Thomas H. Tongue was nominated by acclamation. Mr. Tongue sent the following dispatch to J. M. Whitney secretary of the convention:

Washington, D. C. April 22, 1898 - J. M. Whitney sec. cong. convention, Eugene Oregon: I accept the nomination and upon a republican platform, if elected, I shall labor faithfully in the future as I have endeavored to do in the past, to advance and protect the interests of every person and every locality in the district. 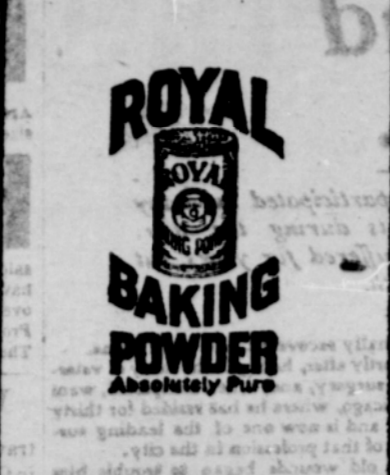
