PROPAGATING STEELHEADS. The hatchery on Salmon river about 45 miles from Portland is now in operation and is pretty certain to prove a success so far as hatching the eggs of Steelhead salmon is concerned. Experiments are also to be made with sturgeon eggs.

The officials were unwilling to undertake this work on the Salmon river fearing their racks would be washed away, so arrangements were made with private parties who received a bonus of \$300. If it proves successful the benefits will be thousands of dollars.

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UNION CONVENTION.

The union convention which met in Eugene last Friday chose C. H. Baker temporary chairman and O. W. Kinsey temporary secretary.

Committees on credentials, on permanent organization and order of business, and on platform and resolutions were appointed. A motion was made and carried that each of the three parties appointed a committee of three to apportion the ticket.

The committee on resolutions and platform adopted the state platform promulgated at Portland and the following resolution:

There is not room in the western hemisphere for the American flag of freedom and the Spanish emblem of despotism and slavery; and we believe congress is obeying the dictates of God and humanity in declaring that the frightful Spanish atrocities in the island of Cuba must cease. We pledge to congress and the president our sincere and earnest support to the end that the armies and navies of the United States assist the people of Cuba in establishing a free and independent government and banish forever from American soil the last decaying remnant of old world despotism. We demand the absolute freedom and independence of Cuba.

F. M. Wilkins was elected permanent chairman and Geo. W. Kinsey secretary.

The following ticket was then nominated: Senator, H. C. Huston of Long Tom, democrat; representatives, C. A. Potter of Lake creek, democrat; W. F. Gray of Cottage Grove, silver republican; and J. F. Kirk of Richardson, populist.

Sheriff, W. W. Withers of Thurston, populist.

Clerk, J. G. Stevenson of Eugene, silver republican.

Assessor, J. E. Yarnell of Mohawk, populist.

Treasurer, A. S. Patterson of Eugene, democrat.

School superintendent, Wm. L. Miller of Lost Valley, democrat.

Commissioner, W. H. Baughman of Pleasant Hill, silver republican.

A resolution was passed ratifying the nominations of J. L. Taylor for surveyor and Dr. W. L. Chesser for coroner which were made by the populist and democratic conventions last month.

The county central committee elected Chas. M. Kissenger chairman and W. K. Scarborough, secretary.

A STEAM SCHOONER. I. B. Cushman informed us a few days ago that the stock for the new vessel to built on the Siuslaw which we mentioned in our columns several weeks ago, is very nearly all subscribed and that he has an order to saw the lumber. The iron, spikes, etc. are to be brought in by the Danielson on her next trip. The plans call for a steam schooner of 125 foot keel, and 32 foot beam, to draw about 11 feet of water. Her engines will be 275 horse power and she will run about 8 knots an hour. Her carrying capacity will be about 300,000 feet of lumber. The total cost of the vessel will be near \$27,000.

I. B. Cushman and Meyer & Kyle will own shares in the vessel but most of the stock is taken by parties in San Francisco.

The construction will commence in a short time. About 20 men are to be employed and it is proposed to push operations till the vessel is completed. A. M. Peterson of Ballard will superintend the work.

FROM THE FAR NORTH

The following letter was received a few days ago.

Sheep Camp, Alaska, Apr. 14, 1898. Editor West: In justice to the people of the Siuslaw that have friends in Alaska I send this report in regard to the accident of yesterday at this place.

I have been here three weeks and not met a Lane county acquaintance between Dyea and Lake Bennett, therefore it is not probable, in fact it is hardly possible that any from your town or vicinity can be buried in the snow.

At 3 o'clock a m., on the 3rd inst, a snow slide took place at the scaler and buried some people but all were rescued and brought back to life but some of them met death later. At 11 a. m., another slide started and there was a blinding storm. A rope 125 feet long was secured and a good man put at each end to keep them in line and a pilot at each end they felt safe. They had not gone 200 feet when a slide struck them and all was over, for every man and woman on the rope was covered. Some 10 or 12 got out alone; by 3 o'clock 15 dead were dug out, and 8 yet alive, making 21 in all. This morning 17 more bodies recovered and one man taken out alive. Two women were taken out, one of them dead. The man I have slept with since I came here is dead. We will bury him to-morrow. There must be many more in the snow but how many is unknown. Several tents have been dug out to-day two miles below here and three dead bodies found in one of them. The canyon is practically one slide from here to the scaler. The dead cannot possibly all be recovered until the snow is all gone in July. The report now comes that there were more people killed between the summit and Lake Linderman than on this slide. Three more bodies have just passed the door.

The mail will be gone in ten minutes and will leave Dyea this evening so excuse haste. My address is Dyea.
