The following is a correct description of the boundaries of Heceta voting precinct as furnished to us by County Clerk Jennings.

Beginning at the Pacific ocean where the center line of sec. 10, tp. 17 S., R. 12 west running east and west through said section intersects said ocean; thence east to the center of sec. 6, tp. 17 S., R. 11 west; thence north 1 1/2 miles to the township line between tps. 16 and 17 south; thence east 4 1/2 miles to the S. E. corner of tp. 16 S., R. 11 W.; thence north to the N. E. corner of said tp. thence east 1/2 mile; thence north 2 miles; thence east 6 miles; thence north about 2 1/2 miles to the county line; thence west to the Pacific ocean, and thence southerly along the shore of said ocean to the place of beginning.

They Range From \$13 Up to \$916.97 Per Month.

When the militia goes into active service it will receive from the national government the same pay as the regular army, which is as follows, per month:

Privates and noncommissioned officers are furnished rations, accommodations, horses and forage, when mounted, and a certain allowance for clothing, quarters and medical attendance.

Commissioned officers are furnished quarters, medical attendance and the privilege of the commissary—that means a chance to buy food, etc., at first cost. They have to buy their own foot clothing, arms, horses and accoutrements.

There is a fair increase of pay after men and officers have served a certain term.
