**FROM BAKER COUNTY.**

Clifton, Ore., May 15th, 1898.  
 To the Editor,  
 Dear Sir: Thinking perhaps that some of the readers of The West would like to hear from Baker county I will drop you a few lines.  
 There is quite a difference between the mild climate of the Siuslaw and the high dry climate of this section. I don't profess to know the altitude of this country but I know it is cold enough. I am about three miles from the summit of the Blue mountains. We freeze nearly every night. We had quite a snow-storm yesterday.  
 Although there are many other industries carried on, mining seems to be the principal occupation here. The man who hasn't got a prospect out in the hills that he can work on or talk about is not in it.  
 Baker is a good county and there is a great deal of business and work going on but to those intending to come here for work, I would say stay away as there are more men than there is work. For a man with money say from one to ten thousand dollars, or more, this is a good country to invest in, as there are some good mines here.  
 I am at work in a placer mine 40 miles southwest from Baker city near the famous Bonanza mine. A visit to that mine soon convinces one that they have truly a bonanza.  
 I made a few purchases while there. Prices are: Flour \$7 per bbl., bacon 15 cts. per lb., beans 6 cts., butter 65 per roll, gum boots \$9 per pair, granulated sugar 10 cts. per lb.  
 The timber is principally yellow pine with row and then a tamarack tree and no underbrush. The regular old eastern porcupine is found here. They sit up in the little pines and chatter like chipmunks. I gathered some nice wild onions today. They grow here in abundance.  
 Tell Uncle Sid Waite this is the country for him to log in as the timber is just like that back in old Wisconsin and he can have snow any depth he wants from four to ten feet.  
 There is much more I could tell you but for fear that my letter is already too long, I will close for this time. With best regards to all,

**DESTROYED BY FIRE.**

About 8 o'clock, May 26, J. C. Goodale's saw mill at Coburg was destroyed by fire. A telegram was sent to Eugene for assistance as it was feared the entire town would be destroyed. The fire was caused by sawdust piling on the boiler and becoming ignited by spontaneous combustion, or a smoldering fire, and burned so rapidly as to be uncontrollable. The planing mill and most of the lumber was saved, but an adjoining building was burned.  
 Mr. Goodale estimated the loss at about \$3,000. There is \$2,500 insurance. The mill will be rebuilt at once.

**TSLITCOOS ITEMS.**

By OCCASIONAL.

The visit of Judge Stearnes and Com. Thompson promises to result in good to the community. If we are correctly informed they promised that which will eventually result in a road from Gardiner to Glenada via South slough. Ere long, we will get an open sesame via Miller's and Gibbs' or by the Glover-Johnson route.

There is a contention over the section of road between Five Mile and Fiddle Creek. Seventeen, or more, want the old survey ignored and a road opened on very much lower ground, via Wilkes' landing. By this route one hill is entirely avoided and the other ridge crossed at a very much lower elevation without increasing the distance, or depriving a single settler of road privileges. We respectfully ask an investigation of the merits of this line which will soon be cut through. There is one marsh of 100 yds., to bridge or corduroy. Otherwise the route is ideal. 'Tis true one can get through on the old line. One lady on Five Mile says that by going on all fours it can be done. A gentleman of the same neighborhood says that the only reason the old survey was not made on higher ground and steeper grades is because the country had no higher hill. On the summit stands the 14 mile stake. It is said to be that distance from Gardiner. Many contend that, after the hard climb to reach it, it is only fourteen miles from heaven. Gardiner and Glenada are both on tide-water. Let us build our road as nearly on the level of the two towns as possible, seeking all the way the "line of least resistance."

Since the judge and county commissioners do not insist upon following the old survey let every friend to good roads protest against going to Gardiner "on all fours" or by heaven's gates. Insist upon lowest passes and a road that best accommodates every settler and that gives to each all the road privileges possible. Let us be guided by good sense, considering all opponents enemies to the country's interests.
