CHARGE FOR EXCHANGE.

The banks of Eugene have published a notice stating that owing to the extra expense entailed on banks by the war revenue bill they will on and after July 1st, 1898 in every instance charge for exchange as follows: On sums of \$25 or less, 5 cents; on sums of \$25 and not exceeding \$100, 10 cents; on each additional \$100 or part thereof, 5 cents.

On every check drawn by a custome on the bank for any amount a two-cent stamp must be affixed and the same must be cancelled by putting on it the initials of the maker and date of cancellation. A heavy penalty is imposed for issuing a check without affixing the necessary stamps.


