THEY USED KNIVES.

How Among Indians. One Dead Another Injured.

Last Saturday night about 10 o'clock three Indians, Bennett Barney, Henry Jackson and Jeff Harney engaged in a fight in town and as a result Barney is dead and Jackson suffering from a knife wound over the pit of the stomach.

They had started to go home and were about getting into their boat on the river bank above Fred Funke's house when the fight occurred. There are several stories about the beginning of the trouble but nobody was present at the time except the three participants.

One story is that Bennett had a bottle of whisky which Jeff tried to obtain and used a knife on Bennett; that Jeff tried to separate them when he also was stabbed.

Jeff says that he and Henry were in a fight and Bennett proposed that they kill Jeff and that he then used the knife in self defense.

After the row Bennett went and asked Marshal Crampton to arrest Jeff for stabbing him. It appearing that Bennett was badly hurt he was taken to the city lockup and Dr. Evans called. He found a gash near one temple and another on the side between the short ribs. He was also suffering from a blow or kick in the abdomen. Bennett was taken home next day and died Monday morning.

Henry was cut near the pit of the stomach but the knife struck a bone otherwise he might also have been killed.

Jeff made his escape after the row but returned Monday forenoon and proposed to give himself up to Marshal Crampton. Constable Evans arrived soon after and took him in charge.

He waived examination and was committed to jail to await action of the grand jury. Constable Evans took him to Eugene Tuesday afternoon.

FELL FROM THE STAGE.

While on his way home from Eugene last Monday Z L Seymour met with a serious injury. He was riding on the stage and after passing Glentena post office took the reins to drive a short distance. One of the wheels struck a rock, throwing Mr. Seymour out upon the ground and both wheels passed over him. Mr. Seymour was badly hurt and said his shoulder blade and several ribs were broken. He was taken to the residence of A Richardson and the stage went on to Mapleton. The steamer Mink was sent to Florence after Dr. Evans and to inform S J Seymour of the accident to his father. The boat returned to head of tide about 3 a m Tuesday morning and they immediately left for Mr. Richardson's on the stage.

News from Manila is that a battle lasting three hours was fought at Manila late July 31st. The Spanish made the attack and were repulsed. The first battalion California volunteers, tenth Pennsylvania, first battalion, third artillery regulars and battery A Utah were engaged. Our loss was 9 killed and 44 wounded.

The attacking force numbered about 3000. Later news says a second battle was fought at Manila Aug. 4th and the American won.
