IN CIRCUIT COURT.

The grand jury at Eugene made their final report Saturday and were discharged.
Judge Hamilton on Saturday discussed all the jurors but one from further attendance at this term of court.
The following cases in which one or both parties reside in this party of the county were brought up:
O. W. Hord vs Robert T. Cooper. Default and order for sale of attached property.
M. J. Haddell vs James A. McLeod et al; foreclosure of lien. Report of referee. Continued.
The Vulcan Iron Works vs The Sinslaw River Lumber Co; confirmation.
Clara Carnes vs Perry Carnes; divorce. Default. Referred to report first day of June term.

Emily Hovey vs The Sinslaw River Lumber Co; to recover money. Default. Judgment for \$372.05 and \$35 attorney fees and order of sale of attached property.
Lucifer E. John vs Addie K. Johnson; divorce. Default. Referred to C. H. Holden to take testimony and report at first day of next term.
The following criminal cases were heard:
State of Oregon vs James Smith for larceny in taking two guns from Barker's store. Jury disagreed.
Chas. Halstead and James Kelley plead guilty of burglary in breaking into an S. P. R. section house and robbing the section men. They were sentenced to three years each in the penitentiary.
John Hay and Ivan Kidwell plead guilty of larceny in a store. Sentenced to two years each in the penitentiary.
Claude McHargue plead guilty of forgery and a sentence of four years imprisonment was given.

The suit of E. D. Horner vs J. B. Coleman to recover \$5,000 on a promissory note was dismissed. Horner and Geo. Weber, a barber of Eugene, were then arrested on a charge of forging the note. At the trial Weber pleaded guilty; the jury disagreed Saturday night in the case of Horner and were dismissed. Another jury was sworn Monday and the case tried the second time. Tuesday afternoon a verdict of "guilty" was rendered.
Tuesday's Guard says: It is likely that the present term of circuit court will adjourn sometime tomorrow to a date early in April. At that time it is likely Branton will be sentenced.

COUNTERFEIT MONEY.

Guard: A very dangerous counterfeit coin is in general circulation. It is a 50-cent piece of the date of 1898. A number of the coins have been detected and marked by the Eugene banks. The counterfeit is a trifle lighter in color than the genuine, having an aluminum tinge. It is lacking in that money "ring," sounding flat and dead.
Examine your money carefully, for a large number of these pieces are supposed to be in circulation in this vicinity.

SURVEYED ORDERED.

A communication was received by some of the settlers on upper Smith river a few days ago from Binger Hermann commissioner of the general land office saying that the interior department had ordered the survey of two townships in the vicinity of Odd post office, viz: township 19 south in ranges 9 and 10 west.
These townships were surveyed about four years ago but the survey was rejected by the department.

14 TRAINS EACH DAY.

This is what it means. On and after March 12th, 1899, the Northern Pacific Railway will start two trains each day flying westward from its eastern terminals. At the same time—not exactly the same hours—two trains will also leave its western terminals for the east. There will then be, each day, moving over the 2933 miles of main track between St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth at the east, and Seattle, Tacoma and Portland on the Pacific coast, FOURTEEN OF THESE TRAINS—in both directions—going at the same time and this in a country where 20 years ago the buffalo was roaming. The Dining cars are a part of the solid through trains and no one need therefore go hungry.
Train No. 1 will leave St. Paul at 8:55 a. m.; train No. 3 at 10:45 p. m.; after all trains have arrived from the east and south, morning and evening. Train No. 2 will leave Portland at 11:30 a. m. and train No. 4 at 11:00 p. m., arriving at St. Paul 2:00 p. m. and 7:30 a. m., respectively, in time for all departing trains eastward. One train goes via Helena, Montana, and one via Butte, in each direction. These trains run through the most important cities of the north-west and are hauled by new and enormous Schenectady locomotives, making when necessary, 75 or 80 miles an hour.
These diurnal trains will amply accommodate the large immigration and tourist travel that seems probable this year.
During the Yellowstone Park season one train in each direction will carry a Pullman First Class Sleeping Car, especially for Park travel.
