April 5th, 1899.
Miss Lulu Whisman has been very ill for a few days, being confined to her bed.
Miss Laura Coleman who is now teaching the spring term of school at this place, came in on Friday's stage.
Miss Nellie Rice left Saturday morning for Walton where she will engage in school teaching.
Mrs Frank Knowles returned from Eugene Thursday morning. Her daughter Mabel will remain there for some time.
We expect to have a wedding in the neighborhood of Mapleton in a few days. A serenading party is being organized, besides this a couple from North Fork expect to be married here Saturday.
The Old Fellows in the vicinity of Mapleton expect to secure a charter soon and institute a lodge at this place. Quite a number of Old Fellows reside near Mapleton and they will have a good lodge.
The Easter services at Point Terrace Sunday were a great success. The church was barely able to seat the spectators. The program was large and interesting and was concluded with an address by Rev. I G Knotts.

THE JETTY WORK.
Bids for jetty work soon to be called for. Specifications for the work at Coos bay, Coquille and Siuslaw are about ready to be sent to Washington for approval. After the specifications are approved bids will be called for and it is quite probable that the work will be commenced about the middle of July.
Dredging operations are about to commence on Coos bay. M L Tower has been appointed government inspector of the work at that place.

FROM MANILA.
Filipinos Deserving Aguinaldo's Lines in Large Numbers.

Manila, April 3.—The arrival of Colonel Deuby, the last member of the American Philippine commission, has decided the commission to issue a proclamation to the rebels at once. It contains no reference whatever to independence, and calls for an unconditional surrender of Aguinaldo and his forces.

All around Malolos white flags are being waved by groups of natives and deserters from Aguinaldo's army. MacArthur is allowing all such to come within the lines, but is insisting on close inspection, to prevent treachery.
It is believed that the rebels will make a fight at Mariguina, near Manila, where a clash between Hall's troops and the rebels took place the other day. This would please the Americans, as it is believed a decisive battle could be secured. From the reports of deserters who are pouring into the American lines at Malolos, Aguinaldo has but a small force left, and his control is visibly impaired.

THE CREAMERY TO START.
O W Hurd is making preparations to start his creamery the 29th, inst. He intends to increase the output considerably this year and has arranged for a skimming station on Maple creek. The station will be under the care of F E Fremont and a team will make a trip every morning from the station down the creek nearly to Tailcoos lake and back after the milk and also return the skim milk left from that received the previous day. In this way the farmers on Maple creek can sell their milk and have no trouble delivering it. They will receive about the same price for it as is paid on the river. If the business at the skimming station this year proves satisfactory, Mr Hurd proposes to extend it further next year and establish skimming stations in other places. In this way the creamery will be made a direct benefit to the farmers on all parts of the river by affording them an opportunity to dispose of their milk at home and receive payment therefor in cash.

THE ROBERTS.
The tug expects to leave for Tillamook today to engage in towing on the bay. She will make monthly trips to Florence to bring in freight.
More importance than usual is attached to the departure of the Roberts today as among her passengers will be the families of Capt. Johnson and Kar-nowsky and Engineer Bernhardt. They will remain at Tillamook while the tug is at work at that place. The people of Florence will keenly regret their departure and wish that circumstances may lead to their speedy return to our city.

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NEW OFFICERS IN CHARGE.
Messrs. Lee, Bickers and Geer Begin Work.

Three new state officers took charge April 1st, J D Lee relieving A N Gilbert as superintendent of the penitentiary; H E Bickers succeeding E M Croisan as superintendent of the reform school, and L B Geer relieving T W Davenport as state land agent. Nearly all the appointments that will be made by these officials at present have already been announced.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A regular meeting of the city council was held Monday evening with all the members present.
Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.
The street committee reported that they had made a contract with John Yates to build those portions of sidewalk on the north side of main street between Adams and Jefferson streets in the original town of Florence which have not been built by property owners.
On motion of Councilman Hurd the street committee were authorized to let a contract for building a crosswalk across First street on west side of Washington street. On motion of Councilman Christensen the committee were instructed to have a new crosswalk built on Hamlin on north side of Main in Morse's addition.
Ordered that one of the new street lamps be placed at the crossing of Main and Washington streets. Agreed that John I Butterfield continue to tend street lamps till expiration of present term of city officers.
Bill of John I Butterfield for \$9 for three months pay as recorder and tending street lamps forty nights, allowed. Also bill of the West \$8.65 for printing. All bills for expenses of marshal's sale continued till next meeting.
J K Benedict asked permission to build a floating wharf at the end of Front and Hamlin streets in Morse's addition, agreeing to construct a wing walk to protect the bank also build a walk for foot passengers from the wharf to the bank and permit people to moor their boats to the wharf. Messrs. Kyle and Hurd were appointed a committee to act according to their best judgement in the matter.
Adjourned.

SPRUCE POINT MILL.

Men have been working in the Spruce Point mill for two weeks or more repairing and putting it in running condition preparatory to sawing lumber. The fitting up was completed Wednesday and sawing was commenced, with a full crew of men, Thursday. E A Evans is in charge and as he is an old hand at the business, we expect he will make things rattle down there this summer.
Adjourned.

14 TRAINS EACH DAY.

This is what it means. On and after March 12th, 1899, the Northern Pacific Railway will start two trains each day flying westward from its eastern terminals. At the same time—not exactly the same hours—two trains will also leave its western terminals for the east. There will then be, each day, moving over the 2000 miles of main track between St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth at the east, and Seattle, Tacoma and Portland on the Pacific coast, FOURTEEN OF THESE TRAINS—in both directions—going at the same time and this in a country where 20 years ago the buffalo was roaming. These trains will be known as No. 1 the Puget Sound Limited, No. 3 the Oregon Limited going west, and No. 2 the Twin City Mail, No. 4 the Twin City Express, going east, and will contain in the aggregate more than 100 cars of various sorts. Each train will have a mail car, a baggage and express car, first and second class coaches, a Free Colonist Sleeping car, a Pullman Sleeping car, a Dining car and one or more Pullman First Class Sleeping cars, so that everybody and everybody's pocketbook can be accommodated. The Dining cars are a part of the solid through trains and no one need therefore go hungry.
Train No. 1 will leave St. Paul at 8:55 a m; train No. 3 at 10:45 p m; after all trains have arrived from the east and south, morning and evening. Train No. 2 will leave Portland at 11:30 a m; and train No. 4 at 11:00 p m, arriving at St. Paul 2:00 p m, and 7:30 a m, respectively, in time for all departing trains eastward. One train goes via Helena, Mont., and one via Butte, in each direction. These trains run through the most important cities of the north-west and are hauled by new and enormous Schenectady locomotives, making when necessary, 75 or 80 miles an hour.
These diurnal trains will amply accommodate the large immigration and tourist travel that seems probable this year.
During the Yellowstone Park season one train in each direction will carry a Pullman First Class Sleeping Car, especially for Park travel.
