METEOR FOUND.

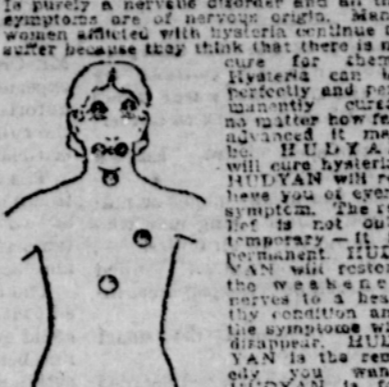
