SIUSLAW JETTIES.

The Work is Improving the Bar Oregonian: Captain W W Harris, corps of United States engineers, has just returned from an inspection of the various government work along the coast of Oregon now under progress, and also the jetty work at Coos bay, Coquille and Siuslaw for which bills are soon to be taken and specifications of which are now ready for distribution to contractors.

He crossed the mountains from Eugene to Florence, and inspected the quarries and the machinery to be used in connection with jetty work to be done there, and found them in very satisfactory condition. The shoal at the end of the jetty there, which is completed about 1000 feet out, has been scoured away by the action of the water, and the extension projects for this season will have to be shortened from 800 to 500 feet, on account of the increased depth of water. The jetty as completed has produced a marvelous effect, the old channel being completely closed, and a new one opened, and this season's work will be a great assistance in maintaining this permanent channel, as every foot of extension will count.

Early in May there came to Florence one J. D. French who evidently is a first class fraud. He represented that he was agent for the American Woolen Mills of Chicago and was soliciting orders for men's clothing. He obtained several orders in Florence collecting part payment in advance and agreed to deliver the goods in from 20 to 30 days. He left here May 8th and nothing has been heard from him since and the parties who ordered the goods conclude they are out the money paid as the clothing has not arrived yet though the time for its delivery is several weeks past.

EVIDENTLY A FRAUD.

Johnny Green has brought in some help from the valley and is rebuilding his house on Middle creek, below Deadwood, which was burned. Israel Willcutt lost a cow recently. After about a week he found her in the woods, with dead twin calves and herself so near dead that he thought it a kindness to shoot her.

We have growled of the coldness of the spring, and compensating weather has come. June 9th the thermometer marked 82 degrees on a cool, shady porch and 94 degrees in the sun at 2:30 p. m.

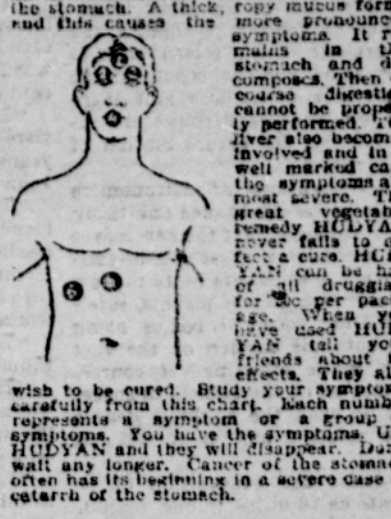
