The schooner Polly, now lying in the port of Bangor, Me., sound and seaworthy in every way, is said to be the oldest American vessel in existence which is still sailing. She was built at Amesbury, Mass., in 1805, and has had an adventurous career. During the war of 1812 she was a privateer, and captured 11 prizes from the British. She was also captured once herself, but was retaken. Her log is now preserved in the Portland custom-house, and her present commander, Captain McFarland, says it is better reading than any of the war books. She is a vessel of 45 tons and is now engaged in the coasting trade.
