BOHEMIA MINES SOLD.

Cottage Grove, July 31.—A group of mines in the Bohemia district, on Fairview mountain, consisting of the following mines: Venuvius, German, Wild Hog, William Tell, Hillside and the Nightingale, belonging to Zinkler and Graber brothers, was sold today to Eastern capitalists, represented by Charles Harding Park, of Boston, for \$35,000. There is over 1000 feet of tunnels, and the ore is free millage. The vein is three to five feet wide. This property has a splendid millsite and an abundance of timber. The new company will begin at once sinking a shaft of considerable depth to ascertain the extent of the mine.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL.

The Marguerite towed a string of boom sticks from Acme to the Mason boom Wednesday afternoon.

Mail: There is some talk of establishing a creamery in Marshfield. Whilst nothing definite has been done in the matter, the scheme is being favorably discussed.

The residence of Palmer Ayres 4 miles north from Eugene was burned last Saturday. The house cost \$2000 a few years ago and partly insured. Nearly all the household goods were saved.

Last Saturday was Miss Grace Evans' ninth birthday and in honor of that event nearly all the girls of her age in town were invited to a party on the picnic ground in West Florence. The afternoon was spent in playing various games and the children all enjoyed the occasion very much.

THREE CONTRACTS LET.

Hale & Smith of Portland Get the Siuslaw Contract.

The Oregonian of July 26th contains the following in regard to the jetty work. Hale & Smith carried off the Siuslaw contract at \$23,737. This involves the moving of 25,000 tons of stone a distance of 14 miles, from a point on Siuslaw river. The north jetty will be extended 600 or 700 feet, and mattresses constructed on the south jetty. The receiving wharf will also be repaired.

Wakefield & Jacobson have secured the contract for building the Coos bay jetties, for the sum of \$123,710. This job involves moving of 230,000 tons of rock a distance of 20 miles, from a point on Coos river to the north jetty. The receiving wharf will be repaired and the tramway over the break water will be made safe for cars carrying the stone blocks. The stone itself is to be moved on barges from the quarries and deposited on that portion of the jetty already constructed, bringing the top up to high tide.

John Kiernan was awarded the work at the mouth of the Coquille, for which he is to receive \$25,993. The north jetty is to be commenced and run out 500 feet, while the south jetty is to be extended 315 feet. The rock needed will amount to 49,000 tons. This will be procured at the Tupper quarries near the south jetty.

The bids were received in the Portland office of war department engineers, and Captain William W. Harts has forwarded them to Washington city for the approval by General John M. Wilson, chief of engineers of the United States army. On their return the formalities will be closed and work will probably begin September 15, as the stipulations provide for beginning the work within 30 days after contracts are signed. The Coos bay work has to be finished within 20 months; that of the Siuslaw and Coquille within 10 months.

Resumption of work on these jetties will give employment to several lumbermen, and the rainy season will not interfere with its progress. As the material for the jetties will all be obtained near by, most of the money appropriated will be spent for labor alone. Carpenters will be needed for repairing the wharves and tramways; blacksmiths and machinists for putting the engines into shape, while quarrymen and laborers will find work getting out the stone and assisting in its transportation. While work is thus springing up along the southern coast, while the great interior of the Northwest is yet busy in railroad building, its harvests and its developing mines.

GENERAL NEWS.

President Houtreux of San Domingo was shot and killed by an assassin July 26th. The crime is said to a political one.

It has been ascertained that Ralph McCoy, James E Lawrence and Clarence Mills, three Oregon boys who were captured by the Filipinos April 23 and have since been supposed to be dead are alive and well but held as prisoners.

At Wallace, Idaho, Paul Corcoran was convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to seventeen years imprisonment for killing James Cheyne at the time of the riot April, 29th when the Banker Hill & Sullivan mill was destroyed.

A special dispatch from Covington Georgia says a mob of 60 masked men made away with three Mormon elders last week. The elders have been proselyting in Jasper county and were endeavoring to persuade a woman to join the church. The mob appeared and aided by her husband secured the elders and rode off with them. The elders have not been seen since.

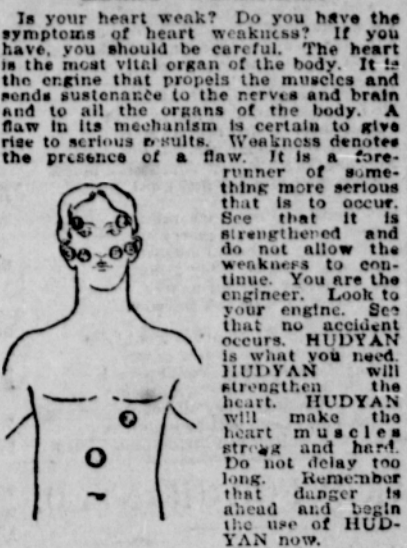
