CONTRACTS APPROVED.

Improvement Work at Siuslaw: Coquille and Coos Bay to Proceed.

Portland Telegram August 11. Upon the recommendation of Captain Harts, United States engineer, the letting of contracts for jetty work at Siuslaw, Coquille and Coos bay has been approved by the chief of engineers.

Wakefield & Jacobson will have the work at Coos bay, John Kiernan at Coquille, and Hale & Smith at Siuslaw. In about two weeks the contracts will be approved. Some of the contractors are anxious to begin operations as soon as possible in order to get as much work done as they can before winter.
